Caldwell Pink' is a "found" rose, made popular by Dr. William Welch who obtained it from a small nursery near Caldwell, Texas. The rose was a gift from a family in Somerville,

Texas who grow the rose for many years. Some rosarians speculate it might actually be 'Pink Pet'. Since its reintroduction in the 1980's, it has become a popular rose with landscapers for its hardiness, ever blooming and disease resistant qualities. It is not very particular about soil conditions, but prefers a sunny open space.

Even though its origins are unclear, it is certain this is a wonderful rose with many great attributes. It blooms continuously from late spring through fall, bearing many clusters of double lilac-pink flowers. What they lack in fragrance they more than make up with an abundance of flowers. This rose is grows into an attractive, full, small shrub, making it suitable for use in many landscape designs where full sun is available. The medium-green foliage remains disease-free throughout the growing season, thus requiring no sprays whatsoever. As a bonus, the foliage often turns reddish purple in the fall.

Caldwell Pink can be used in many landscape designs where a small shrub is needed. Use it in drifts, masses, or as an accent. It is naturally compact, so it will show best when used near the front of a mixed border of shrubs and perennial flowers. Its bright, lilac-pink flowers bloom in clusters, often producing 3 to 4 shoots bearing clusters of 20 to 50 or more 1 ½ inch flowers. Even though it does not set hips, new flowering shoots can be stimulated throughout the year by removing spent flower stalks back to a leaf below the multiple flowers stems.

In the late 1970s or early 80's Dr. and Mrs. Stahl of Houston, Texas collected an outstanding rose near

Katy, that soon became known as Katy Road Pink. Later, after further study, it has been determined that this selection is probably a Buck rose named 'Carefree Beauty'. Famed breeder Griffith Buck first released Carefree Beauty in 1977 but this rose has enjoyed much more popularity under the name Katy Road Pink than it did under its trademarked name.

Carefree Beauty forms large (4"-5"), light pink, semi-double blooms with up to 20 petals each. Flowering begins in spring and continues in cycles until first frost. These flowers open medium-light pink but colors are often more vivid in the cool weather of spring and fall. The color fades slightly to light pink as blooms age. The plant forms an upright shrub, 4' to 5' in height with medium sized, smooth, olive green foliage.

Carefree Beauty has a very well shaped form that creates an attractive accent for perennial borders and beds. This selection can be used in mass to create a breath taking sea of color or as a specimen plant providing a focal emphasis in the garden. Carefree Beauty also creates large hips which are an additional asset.

Forming an open, but extremely graceful bush, 'Carefree Beauty' appears to have few insect or disease problems and is not particular about soil or growing conditions. It is free blooming, probably one of the most floriferous pink roses, with new buds appearing all the time.

Once established, it is very difficult to catch this rose out of bloom and the flushes of scented, semi-double flowers simply smother the bush in bright rose pink. One plant on each side of your gate or driveway will turn your yard into a traffic hazard.

Regarded as the only white China rose, 'Ducher' blooms a soft ivory-white... The buds are very round and sometimes have a

hint of pink on the outer petals opening to a delicate swirl of fragrant ivory petals. Smaller than many Chinas, this is a good candidate for a container. Although it exhibits the typical bronzy new growth, the foliage of 'Ducher' is uncharacteristically light green.



An absolutely delightful rose that everyone falls in love with. It has medium green foliage with red new growth and lovely ivory double flowers that are fragrant. It blooms continuously all season, and is almost never bothered by disease. Many people like to grow this rose in a large pot. One of the few white China roses in commerce. Zones 7-9.

Name: Pink Marie Daly

Repeat, once established, blooms "full blast" from spring - frost. Double, small clusters, long, pointed bud, fully double (1 ¾ ")

Easy care shrub rose, few thorns, lots of , very fragrant, double pink blooms. Successive flushes of bloom spring to frost. Year 2003 was Texas SuperStar, new color of renowned antique rose 'Marie Pavie.' Good disease and alkaline soil tolerance. Use drip or soaker hose irrigation.



'Marie Daly' is the perfect rose for the shrinking landscape. You get big rose performance on a small plant that won't fill or overwhelm small spaces. Rosa x polyantha 'Marie Daly' is a fragrant, pink flowered sport of the popular polyantha, "Marie Pavie". Plantsman Greg Grant identified the sport on his mother's 'Marie Pavie' rose in Arcadia, Texas and the rest is history.

"Marie Daly' is a fragrant, free flowering, pink polyantha. The pink color is deeper in cooler weather and on newly opened flowers. Flowers have a 17-25 petal count. Buds are long and gracefully pointed and flowers emit a sweet musk fragrance. Foliage is a small-medium size, abundant and dark green. Plants get about 3 to 4 feet tall and wide. Plants have a rounded, uniform shape and the stems are mostly thornless.

Name: Mme Antonio Mari

Height: 3' to 5' tall

It blooms almost constantly." The fragrant flowers are Camellia-like shaped and vary in shades of pink which fade to a cream. The bush is rather full and rounded for a Tea and is very easy to grow. This rose was named for the wife of the breeder so we suspect it was the best in his collection.



Camellia-like blooms are rosy flesh shaded lilac on a tidy bush, suitable for containers. Quilled petals create shapely, fragrant blooms that are double, full and large. The buds are particularly beautiful. The plant has plum colored canes with light green leaves and thorns. It roots very, very easily, and has a nice tea aroma in the hot weather. Antoine Marie of Nice, France, produced this reliable Tea rose during the period when Teas and Chinas were very popular. This rose was named for his wife.

Like so many of the old roses, 'Madame Antoine Mari' works well as a stand alone specime, providing a useful accent in a perennial border. Plant 'Madame Antoine Mari' in full sun and well drained soil. Keep a 3" to 4" layer of organic mulch around plants during the establishment and thereafter. The plant has good disease resistance. Use 'Madame Antoine Mari' as a specimen plant, mass planting or even as a container plant.

Name: Monsieur Tiller

Handsome and distinctive, this large, upright shrub bears flowers that are a mixture of pale rose, salmon and purple. Fully open flowers of Monsieur Tillier' are compact and attractive, flat and very double with petals that are often imbricated. Its rich and unique fragrance is like a spicy herbal tea - very relaxing!

Large, very double, quartered blooms of cream flushed with the faintest blush of pink. Luscious fragrance from a most delicately coloured rose. Green button eye finishes the lovely effect. A luscious rose that weighs down with the abundance of its flowers throughout the summer season. Low spreading with abundant fresh green foliage.

This is a hybrid tea rose bred in France at the end of the 19th century. It blooms mostly in spring and fall. The flowers are very fragrant, with a center that contains more orange than the outside petals. It is an upright bush, up to 5 feet tall and wide

Name: Mutabilis

Height: 4' to 10' tall

Fragrance: Yes, slightly musk, but doesn't last

This most interesting rose was once sold as 'Tipo Ideale', and it is ideally suited to illustrate the typical China trait of darkening with age, instead of fading. Nowhere is that trait more visible than in the flowers of 'Mutabilis', whose single petals open sulfur yellow, changing through orange to a rich pink and finally crimson. Bright, silky flowers of all these colors will often be on display at the same time, looking as if a group of multi-colored butterflies has settled on the bush. This aspect earned 'Mutabilis' its common name—"The Butterfly Rose". A healthy, well-branched shrub, 'Mutabilis' will easily grow to 6 feet, making a fine specimen plant whose showy flowers are accented by the bronze color of the new growth. This is a very popular rose due to its distinct coloration.



The origins of Mutabilis pre-date 1896. This selection was first introduced in 1934 by Swiss botanist Henri Correvon. He received the original plant from an Italian Prince. It is still unclear if the plant originated in China or if it was a hybrid from the prince's garden in Isola Belia.

The flowering characteristics of Mutabilis are what make it uniquely attractive. The 3", silky blooms open pale yellow in color and slowly change to shades of pink and eventually crimson. When a plant is in full bloom with these multi-colored flowers it appears to be covered with butterflies.

Mutabilis is an extremely versatile and virgorous rose cultivar. This selection can tolerate partial shade and thrives in poor soil, although foliage may turn yellowish under alkaline conditions. Plants make an excellent hedge or mass planting. In mild climates and protected locations, Mutabilis can reach 10 plus feet in height. This cultivar needs ample room to provide maximum landscape performance.

Name: New Dawn

Height: 15' to 20' climber

Fragrance: Moderately sweet, green apple

This healthy climber, a repeat blooming sport of 'Dr. W. Van Fleet', bears long, full-pointed buds which are soft pink and fade to blush-cream as the flower opens fully. The foliage maintains a lustrous, dark green hue throughout the growing season. Give this vigorous rambler plenty of room to grow and you will be rewarded by years of beauty and fragrance.



This was the first rose to be patented. Itself, a sport of Dr. Van Fleet and almost identical to it with the exception of New Dawn's reblooming capabilities (it blooms on this year's wood versus last year's). Very beautiful, soft pink blooms are semi-double with long petals. Blooms are born in clusters on a healthy vigorous bush. Light fragrance. Reblooms reliably. Foliage is a deep very shiny green. Disease resistant. New Dawn is probably the most favoured and popular climbing rose of all times

The yardstick against which all repeat flowering climbers are judged. In 1997 'New Dawn' was voted the most popular rose in the world at the 11th World Convention of Rose Societies. Silvery, blush-pink, medium sized, double flowers with nice form produced in profusion on a great plant. May be grown as a shrub. Winter hardy to zone 4. Outstanding. Always in bloom z 4-9, 15+ petals.

Caring for New Dawn is a breeze as it is a very low maintenance plant. And pruning Climbing New Dawn is just a matter of trimming the canes to keep them in bounds

It flowers in glorious profusion in early summer and then reblooms with less of a show through the rest of the season. This rose deserves to be on the top 10 climbing roses list. Zones 5-10, height 20-30 feet.

Name: Perle d'Or

Height: 3' to 6'

Fragrance: Yes, very

Easy to grow. Blooms well in hot weather. Good for mass plantings, hedges, or containers. Can tolerate a wide range of conditions from Western exposure to afternoon shade.

This dainty little rose has a powerful perfume that can scent an entire room. Buds that are similar to 'Cécile Brünner' change from nearly orange to golden pink as they unfold in small clusters. The silky petals curl back neatly upon opening into a delicate pompon shape. Foliage is a soft apple green, healthy, and full on a plant that is seldom out of bloom.



Perle d'Or (pearl of gold) was bred and introduced in France in 1884 by Rambaux; Dubreus. It produces highly fragrant, pompon shaped blossoms throughout spring, summer and fall. The buds open to be a beautiful peach color in the center surrounded by silky white margins. As the buds open the petals curl backwards to form the pompon blossom this rose displays. The blossoms stand out against the lush green foliage of the plant. The canes of this rose are almost thornless, making it well suited for landscape use. The rose is a healthy and strong grower that is well suited for highly alkaline clay soils.

This beautiful small shrub rose is recommended to be planted on 6 foot centers to allow for adequate air movement all around. The optimum location to plant is near a patio, deck, kitchen window, or any location where you can enjoy its delightful fragrance and non-stop blossoms. This rose is also a wonderful selection for a large container on a deck or patio as well.

Name: Pink Double Knock Out

Height: 3' to 4'

Fragrance: Very light

Vigorous, compact, mounded and bushy. 1 to 5 flowers per cluster, up to 25 blooms per flowering branch. Deep mossy green foliage. Fall foliage is lustrous purple with rich maroon undertones. Very good disease tolerance. Generous blooms from spring until the first hard frost.



Pink Double Knockout is a mutation of (Red) Double Knockout and is the same in all respects, except the flower color is hot bubble gum pink. You get the same combination of double blooms, low maintenance (no spraying, no dead-heading, and no mounding with soil for winter protection) and continuous repeat bloom. Like Double Knockout, Pink Double Knockout will be even more floriferous than the original Knockout - with petal counts of 18-25 (twice the number of Knockout) carried 3-6 roses on a stem. The additional petals present a fuller flower that is simply breathtaking. Three or four stems will fill a large vase. The blooms are about 2 1/2 - 3 inches wide and are borne in incredible abundance. Pink Double Knockout is self-cleaning; even without dead-heading, the blooms maintain a continuous show of color from early June to hard frost - accompanied by beautiful clean foliage almost year round. The blossoms will survive light to moderate frost.

Both Double Knockouts present themselves in a denser, more compact (4 x 4 feet) and upright fashion than the original Knockout's 5-6 foot height and broad, spreading form. The season ending color of this rose is exceptional with its rich burgundy leaves in the fall. Everything you loved about the original Knockout roses you will love about the new Pink Double Knockout - with even more winter hardiness, improved shade tolerance, reduced height and width - and the brightest color of all the Knockouts.

Although Knockout Roses are rated as being virtually unscented, we have noticed a distinct pleasant rose fragrance when just walking by group plantings. The individual blossoms may be almost scentless, but because there are so many blooms at one time, the perfume is indeed noticeable and delightful.

Name: Rainbow Knock Out

As with other Knock Out roses, Rainbow Knock Out was bred to be “chemical free” so no pesticides are needed. It naturally resist rust, mildew, blackspot, Japanese beetles and rose midge and should perform extremely well in any North American garden, from cold Wisconsin nights to hot Florida days.

Rainbow Knock Out easily withstands late spring frosts and grueling cold temperatures to -20°F without winter protection. And it can handle the devastating droughts of summer.

The small light pink painted yellow center blooms finish nicely to a light coral color. Growing only 3 feet tall, Rainbow Knock Out produces cup like flower that contrast pleasantly with the dark green, semi glossy foliage. A nice display of hips late in the season complements the late fall blooms.

Rainbow Knock Out can be planted almost anywhere in the yard. And its applications are limitless, from single specimens and mixed plantings to sweeps of color, hedges and even in containers. Unlike traditional roses, it blooms in moderate shade, with as little as four hours of sunshine.

Knock Out Roses are easy to grow and do not require special care. They are the most disease resistant rose on the market. They have stunning flower power with a generous bloom cycle (about every 5-6 weeks) that will continue until the first hard frost. All of the Knock Out Roses are self-cleaning so there is no need to deadhead.

The Knock Out® Family of Roses can fit into any landscape. Plant them individually among shrubs, annuals and perennials in mixed beds and borders. Plant them in large groups to create a colorful hedge. Plant them along a foundation to provide a bright border.

'Reve d'Or' is a useful climbing rose that has recently been endorsed as one of the [Earth-Kind Roses](#). In spite of the French name it has its roots in Charleston, SC. John Champneys was a rice planter who loved roses and crossed the southern favorite China rose, 'Old Blush' with the Musk Rose, a European rose popular during Shakespeare's time for its fragrance.

The first introduction in about 1811 was named after its breeder, 'Champneys Pink Cluster'. It was later sent by Philippe Noisette, a local florist, to his brother in France for further breeding where it was further crossed with various Tea roses that were known for their ease of growth, re-blooming characteristics and disease tolerance.

'Reve d'Or' was first introduced in 1869 and became popular for its lovely beige-yellow coloration, masses of flowers and outstanding fragrance. Impressive on fences, walls, trellises and arbors it is moderately vigorous, reaching 10-12' in several years.

French for "dream of gold", this lovely, graceful climber lives up to its name with ease. Nearly thornless it is useful in close quarters. It is especially recommended for use on porch pillars, where the pendulous, globular flowers can be seen and appreciated more easily. Once trained up and established 'Rêve d'Or' will display for its admirers a wealth of large, loosely double, buff yellow roses with a rich Noisette perfume. It blooms all season, but its fall performance is best.

It is a vigorous, trailing rose that is covered continuously with masses of bloom. Outstanding landscape rose. Very double bloom form. It will occasional repeat later in the season. Decorative buds. Double 3' blooms in clusters.



This versatile rose can be grown as a mannerly climber or, because of its semi-prostrate habit, can be grown as a trailer. The choice is yours. Double, creamy-white flowers of slight fragrance handsomely decorate the dark, glossy foliage of this vigorous rose. It is a perfect candidate for a white garden because the lovely blooms reflect light well at night. This cultivar also produces beautiful orange-red hips in fall. This non-patented cultivar is easily rooted from cuttings.

Sea Foam was developed by breeder E.W. Schwartz and introduced by Conrad-Pyle (Star Roses) in 1963. This cultivar is the product of a series of crosses between White Dawn and Pinocchio.

Grows in the White House rose garden. Although Sea Foam is generally referenced as a climber, this selection also has broad use as a groundcover. Used in mass, Sea Foam can provide a spectacular display of color which contrasts nicely against its dark green foliage. This selection is frequently used in areas with steep embankments, hillsides and other challenging landscape areas. Of course Sea Foam can also be trained as a climber or weeping standard. Both of these forms can be very dramatic in the landscape.

Here's another rose that some believe to be the true 'Hume's Tea Scented China.' Right or wrong this rose produces the palest of pink, tea-like blooms on a 3 to 4 foot thick bush. The plant is twiggy in growth, more like our China roses and can mildew a little in the early spring. The flowers are good for cutting and have an unusual fragrance that probably earned it its name.



Spice is classified as a Bermuda Mystery rose due to its unknown parentage. But there's no mystery about its performance. Spice produces wave after wave of blush pink, double blossoms that have a tea-like fragrance. Many knowledgeable rosearians believe that Spice is the true 'Hume's Tea Scented China,' (1809) and along with Parks Yellow tea-scented China (1824) parented a long list of modern cultivars including Hybrid Teas.
