September Gardening To-Do List

Time to get busy again! The last two months have been incredibly humid, but according to the Farmer's Almanac, after the 8th of this month, we will be getting frequent thunderstorms and cooler weather. Keep your fingers crossed! In the meantime, get ready to plant, feed, prune, divide, conquer, and be on the lookout.

Plant asters, butterfly weed, cornflower, crocus, daylilies, dianthus, Euryops, impatiens, larkspur, Louisiana irises, petunias, phlox, obedient plants, salvia, sedums, spider lilies and stock.

Sow the following flower seeds: alyssum, bluebonnets, calendula, cockscomb, cosmos, four o'clocks, hollyhocks, larkspur, marigolds, poppies, snapdragons and sunflowers. This is also the month to throw out your wildflower seeds for the spring.

Sow the following herbs: all perennials and parsley. Sow the seeds of borage, chamomile, chives and summer savory. Sow the plants or seeds of cilantro, dill and fennel.

Sow the following vegetables: early to mid-month: beans, peas, and summer squash; and mid- to late month: broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Chinese cabbage, collards, garlic and kohlrabi.

Feed your roses, magnolias and gardenias much-needed nutrients and with luck, they will give you fall color. Feed your chrysanthemums every two to three weeks until you see buds, then once a week until you see color. Actually, give everything a good feeding this month to help it prepare for winter temperatures and to give you the lush look the cooler temperatures will bring.

Prune the dead and damaged wood on trees and shrubs. You can also prune pyracanthas lightly to highlight the red berries.

Divide amaryllis, daylilies, callas and cannas, liriopes and wood ferns, all of which will probably appreciate the added room. The divisions can then be transplanted, traded or gifted.

Conquer weeds, fall webworms and brown patch that are common September garden enemies. Conquer weeds by planting cover crops like vetch, annual rye, legumes and clover. These should be tilled in two to three weeks before spring planting to allow time to compost. Kill fall webworms with a BT spray. St. Augustine is notorious for inviting brown patch this time of year. If you have had this fungus in the past, think prevention. Take these five steps: aerate, apply either one-half inch of compost topdressing or spray compost tea over lawn, spread cornmeal at a rate of 20 pounds per 1000 square feet, **avoid** high nitrogen fertilizers and keep mowed three inches tall or taller.

Lookout for bulbs! Now is the time to begin pre-chilling tulips, crocus, daffodils and hyacinths.

Are you lucky or smart enough to have kept last year's poinsettias alive? If so, force them into bloom for the holidays! According to *Central Texas Gardener*, beginning on the fall equinox, give potted poinsettias 14 hours of darkness every 24-hour period. Dilute a water-soluble fertilizer to 1/4 strength with every watering. Your poinsettias should show color around Thanksgiving. At that point, restore them to bright, indirect sunlight and reduce the fertilizer.

Tomato Growing 101 - New! Spring 2010

The best garden is a well-planned garden, so while you wait for spring, get ready for the best tomato harvest by taking the new online course Tomato 101 - The Basics of Growing Tomatoes. This course teaches all aspects of growing tomatoes in a home garden, at your own pace and in your own home.

The course covers: Garden and soil preparation, Plant selection and training, Fertilization, Irrigation, Weed, disease and insect control, and General care.
