

# January Meeting Program Mark Fanick -Fruit Trees

The speaker for the January's Master Gardener's meeting was Mark Fanick of Fanick's Garden Center. He touched on a variety of subjects - fruit trees in American culture, bare root/container transplanting, soil preparation, identifying pests and diseases, and chill hours.

When the nursery receives bare root fruit trees they are dipped in root stimulator. Mark discussed 2 types of root stimulators, Organic (Thrive, Bio-Tone starter plus, Carl Pool) and non organic (Green-Light, Fertilome, Superthrive). Thrive and Bio-Tone contain beneficial bacteria and fungi, Carl Pool is a good root activator and Superthrive is good for recovering plants, not for growth. The trees are then pruned and stored in sand pits until purchased by customers. When sold the tree is bagged in wet compost and rock phosphate, to increase root growth. Two composts were mentioned, Lady Bug and Back To Nature.

There are certain diseases (brown rot, peach scab, and fire blight) peach leaf diseases (leaf curl and mildew) and pests (stink bugs, weevils, scale, and borers) common to peaches. Remedies for diseases include Liquid Copper, Captan, Serenade and for fire blight Ferti-lome. Oil sprays work best on whitefly, spinosad and oil spays for leaf miners, and for scale spinosad is best. Some organic cures include Captain Jacks, and Green Light products. Oil sprays in winter get you a good start on pest control. The "Red Baron Peach" is a good tree for our area. It has beautiful red flowers, forms good fruit, and has a good flavor.

Open center pruning is well suited to peach trees. This requires leaving 3 or 4 well-spaced wide angled branches to form a bowl-shaped framework. Pear trees should be pruned to a more upright candelabra shape. Cut limbs above nodes with growth in the direction you want.

Pecan trees need one pollinator tree for every 10 trees. Largest problem for pecan tree is pecan scab. This is best treated with a copper fungicide starting fromJune 1<sup>st</sup> on.

'Celestial fig' and 'blue giant' fig trees are 2 good varieties for our area. Mark suggests staying away from the 'brown turkey' fig.

Fruit trees require a certain number of chill hours for good fruit production. Any hour of cold between 32 F and 45 F contributes one hour to satisfying a tree's chilling requirement. To guarantee good production it is a good idea to have trees with diverse chill hour requirements. For our area trees with chill hours between 350-650 are good. Leave frost damage alone to protect the tree, don't prune until they are about to bud, around Feb. 14.

#### Marks tidbits...

- -leave frost damage alone to protect the plant, don't prune until Jan-Feb
- -fog or heavy mist weather is the best time to transplant evergreens
- -chicken wire and 90-100% castor oil around dripline of plant to stop gophers
- -don't plant bare root plants above the graft
- -Elmers wood glue can seal cuts
- -yellow sticky cards placed around plants can help to identify bug problems.

The Guadalupe Co. Master Gardeners Association was incorporated in 1993. The original name was Seguin Master Gardeners but was quickly changed to Guadalupe County Master Gardeners.

Four of the first five training classes were held at Samuel Clemens High School in Schertz. Class #2 was held at Seguin High School. Classes #6 through #10 were conducted at the Guadalupe Co. Extension Service building in Seguin. Two classes were conducted in 1993, 1994 and 2000. There was no training class in 1999.

# **History - Guadalupe County Community Garden**

The first two photos were taken during the spring of 2009 at the backside of the Guadalupe County Annex Building in Schertz-the location of the then "proposed" new Schertz Community Garden. In the group photo are Mary Bowe, Bob Grafe, Linda Bruno, George Ammermann, Kay Wolverton and Kathy Carroll. The "walking over" photo was an "action" scene of the first Schertz Community Garden Committee: Mary Bowe, Linda Bruno, Kathy Carroll, George Ammermann, Kay Wolverton and Deedy Wright. The third photo is a photo of the GCMGA Board that spring, along with Travis Franke, who actually took the action necessary to move ahead with the adoption of the plan to move forward with the Schertz Community Garden plan.

These are wonderful "older" photos for the history of the garden. Originally, the garden was set aside by the Guadalupe County Commissioners Court as the "second" community garden for the Juvenile Probation Department at my request, as the department's chief, through Commissioner Wolverton. The Juvenile Department received a five-year "lease" to use the property now occupied by the community garden. George and I discussed that for some time before agreeing that the space might be better utilized by the Master Gardeners - especially on the west-end of the county. That was later proposed and agreed to by the commissioners court. That's actually how the garden became a reality.
