The selective weeding out of plants that don't rise to the occasion is almost complete...probably this spring.

You also know, very well, that I 'preach' about properly selected native plants and limited pushing of the zone envelope. You may not get caught this year or next in pushing the zone envelope, but you

will be caught. Sometimes it's a costly mistake to make from which you may have been spared...for now. Humm, a teachable moment...perhaps. But, you have all the tools available to keep you from mistakes like this.

Mother Nature will not be fooled, whether with garden plants or vegetable plants. It is what it is, now, not before, not after.

The next topic is: Proper Preparation Prevents......and you know the rest. Good, NO, GREAT gardens begin with proper preparation. The plant

beauty you see above the ground begins with what happens at the roots. Know the needs of the plants you choose....sun, shade, alkaline, acidic, xeric, or

water hungry. Soil tests can't hurt....Prepare the best draining nutrient rich soil you can... so composting can't hurt either. Choose plants with similar requirements and plant them near each other so that xeric plants don't drown and hydrophytes don't dry up. Guess what? This might even save water.

One question to consider is: Just how many ill-chosen plants do you want to pot- up in the fall and drag onto the patio, into the house, cover up and uncover all winter, or shove in with all the junk you've stored in that little greenhouse? So....this is fun!!!!
Hummm....a teachable moment....perhaps.



Candace Mullen- For her service as editor of the "Tip of the Week" newspaper project which servers


