How to measure the area of your garden

Squares and Rectangles: Multiply width by length

Triangles: Measure the two sides that meet at a right angle. Multiply the length of one side by 1/2 the length of the other side. It doesn't matter which is which.

How to Estimate Mulch Sold by the Bag

There are 27 cubic feet in a cubic yard. To convert cubic yards to cubic feet, multiply the cubic yards by 27.

For example: assume you need 2.8 cubic yards of mulch. Multiply 2.8 by 27. That equals about 75.5 cubic feet of mulch

Most mulch comes in 1 1/2 cu ft bags. So divide 75.5 cubic feet by 1.5 which equals about 50 bags of mulch.

If your mulch comes in 2 cu ft bags simply divide 75.5 cubic feet by 2.

Soil PH

Circles: Measure the circle's radius. The radius is the The ph scale is a measure of alkalinity and acidity of 1 measure from the center of circle to the edge. Multi-

ply the radius by itself. Then multiply that number by 3.14 to get the circle's area.

Curves and irregular shapes: Lay a rope or extension cord along the border. Straighten them out to create a regular shape such as a square. Then use the formula above.

soil and above 7 is alkaline soil. You will hear people refer to acid soil as sour and alkaline soil as sweet.

Sun Protection Factor (SPF)

UVB rays are the burning rays and the primary cause of sunburn. Minutes to burn without sunscreen X SPF number = maximum sun exposure time. Example: If you burn in 10 minutes X SPF20 = 200 minutes. The SPF number applies to UVB rays only. There is no rat-

ing system for UVA rays. UVA rays penetrate deeper into the skin. They are the rays that cause suppression of the immune system. (development and spread of skin cancer) and aging. Use a broad spectrum product.

Sun Protective Clothing

Garments have a label listing the ultraviolet factor (UPF) value which lists the protection the garment gives by the fabric absorbing the UV rays. A UPF rating of 20 allows 1/20th of the suns rays to pass through the fabric.

Raised Bed Construction

Everyone is unique so it is nice to custom build. To find the WIDTH of your bed, sit at a table and reach forward until you begin to bend slightly. Measure that distance. It should never be more than 30" wide. For - Crystal Fisher HEIGHT, sit in a comfortable chair. Bend down and measure where your hands can easily reach. Make this your height.

Do the same to measure for a standing or handicapped bed. DEPTH - 8-9" for most herbs, annuals, and some vegetables to 12" for deeper rooted vegetables, perennials, shrubs. LENGTH - Longer is not better. Have two shorter length beds with space between them. Use a N-S orientation to maximize sunlight. With tall plants consider E-W orientation.

Building Materials

Most people prefer cedar, red wood, cypress etc. Look at concrete blocks, bricks, or products like polyethylene blocks (some look like stone). There are also the recycled products such as trex.

RAILROAD TIES: these are treated with creosote which can leach into the soil but is not absorbed by roots so it will not go into plant tissues. It can, however, volatize into the air and plant foliage may be harmed by the vapors. This is especially true during hot weather.

PRESSURE TREATED WOOD could be used if it is not treated with chemicals such as pentachlorophenol.

CCA wood: this is where, under high pressure, chromated copper arsenate is forced into the cells of the wood. It is chemically bound to the wood so it does not leach into the soil. The US Environmental Protection Agency has approved its use in gardens. Wear masks and eye protection when cutting and dispose of leftover materials properly.

Editors note: There are many different opinions published on the safety of using railroad ties, pressure treated wood and CCA wood for vegetable garden use. Research before you use.

Organic Certification Workshop Sheds Light on Process

The Texas Organic Farms and Gardeners Association's annual 3 day conference was held at the Killeen Civic Center. "The main focus is on building the health of the soil. If you have healthy soil, you have healthy plants, and the plants resist disease and pests" says Association secretary Amanda Vanhoozier, of Coppell. Guest speaker Howard Garrett, "The Dirt Doctor" has been promoting growing organically since 1985. Numerous commercial projects have attested to 40-50% savings in water use.

Leslie McKinnon's "Organic Certification Workshop" helped to simplify the complexity that surrounds the procedure for getting certified to use the "Organics" label. With 55 agents in Texas who process this certification, Leslie is able to clarify the mountains of paperwork required by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The trade show, open to the public, allowed direct conversation with those manufacturers of products we have used in Bell County and in our greenhouse. If the opportunity presents itself again in Bell County it is an opportunity not to be missed.

Lilium x 'Triumphator'/Triumphator Lily

While living in Houston, I read an article about the Triumphator Lily and saw a nursery that had some. I eagerly went to this nursery and they were going quick. I got two of the last ones, and thought they were rather expensive, but the flower was so beautiful. I planted them at home and was thrilled that they came up the next year. When we moved to Temple, I planted them in a pot, so as not to lose them, and they stayed that way, getting very leggy, and looking not so healthy. I had to wait until I had a garden to put them in, probably about a year, and then planted them. I was surprised at how many bulbs I broke apart; now I have several beautiful, glossy, green leaves on shoots



coming up. The lilies get to about 2-5 feet and bloom in the summer. These lilies add fragrance, color, and beauty to the garden and may be used in containers or mass plantings. Since they produce a large cluster

of flowers on a stem, they are a great cut flower and add to any arrangement. I am anticipating a sea of pink and white heads blowing in the wind.

These planters cost \$44.00 for the 20 x 20 x 2 1/2 inch (45 cell) and \$29.00 for the smallest (10 cell). There is an extension for the 20 x 20 one to extend the depth to 5 inches. Go to www.brightgreenliving.com
