Our thanks go to David Fitch and the greenhouse committee for the good work.

We tried something new during this year's plant sale. We had seminars on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. I think we might have learned that we cannot compete with Friday night football, no matter how important our seminar is. Thanks to all who participated in this.

Don't think that just because we have been successful in September that we can sit around and think about this success. We still have work to do. Our greenhouse is in need of repair and decisions must be made about the "hardening" house. A committee is being formed and we will be making a recommendation to the board as to the future of these structures. Your ideas and recommendations are important to us and please let me hear from you.

I will not be at the October general meeting. Sharon and I will be going to New York State to witness the incredible "changing of the colors" that occurs this time of year. Hope we picked the right week for this.

Another Successful Plant Sale!

Well, the much awaited Fall Plant Sale is behind us. I would say that by most standards it was yet another success in a growing line of BCMGA plant sales. With very few exceptions, the plants arrived from all three vendors in excellent condition. They were uniform in height and color and were mostly pest and disease free. This makes for much easier selling when customers are pleased with the

appearance and are not troubled with selecting the best looking plant.

Our goal was to take in \$10,000 from the sale and we exceeded that by a couple of hundred dollars. This, in spite of the fact that we had a fairly large inventory of unsold roses. I think we may have temporarily reached market saturation on roses. We've sold quite a few over the past several sales. I hope to liquidate the remainder of the plants through a half price sale to members.

Another measure of success is the member and community involvement. We had 313 customers and 23

members who signed in. I know there were some more members that participated but neglected to sign in. There were 61 people who attended our classes. That number is a little disappointing but I think the message here is to avoid classes in the afternoon and never conduct class on a Friday evening during high school football season.

The Kids Kamp was a nice addition to the program.

It was well attended, and the children seemed to have a great time as well as a great learning experience.

Thank you one and all for your participation in making this another successful and fun event.

Herb Group Tests Citrus Herbs

The September meeting of the Herb Study Group covered lemon and lime flavored herbs. We tasted waters made with Lemon Verbena, Lemon Balm. Lemon Grass, Lemon Thyme, Lemon Basil, Kaffir Lime, and Lime Basil. The favorites seemed to be Lemon Balm, Lemon Verbena and Lime Basil. I demonstrated making a virgin Mojito with and without Lime Basil to show how Lime Basil can make a drink much more lime tasting without adding more tartness. I made pasta with onion, roasted garlic and lemon basil. The lemon basil keeps its bright color better than most herbs once they're cooked. The flavor was definitely more like lemon than basil. I also made Lemon Verbena Tea Bread. Even though the leaves were quite brittle when picked, they became soft and unnoticeable when baked except for the wonderful flavor they imparted to the bread and glaze.

Nancy Blansett brought along a book on Lemon

Herbs by Ellen Spector Platt naming quite a few more lemon herbs than any of us had heard of. Frances Idoux brought along a gelato made with infused Lemon Verbena which was refreshing and extremely tasty.

Herbal Recipes

Salad Burnet Spread

8 oz cream cheese

2 green onions, minced with tops

3 tbsp chopped salad burnet

3 tbsp dill

1 - 2 tbsp mayonnaise or sour cream

1/2 tsp dried mustard

1 1/2 tsp curry powder

2 tsp chopped chives pinch of salt

Blend together the first 5 ingredients, then add the last 4 ingredients. Serve with slices of party pumpernickel bread.

Lemon Verbena Pecan Crisps

1/2 cup lemon verbena *leaves, packed

2 cups sugar

2 cups unsalted butter

3 cups flour

1/2 tsp salt

2 tsp baking soda - or these two can be substi-

1 tsp cream of tartar - tuted w/baking powder

1 cup chopped, toasted pecans

4 cups corn flakes

Devein lemon verbena leaves. Process with sugar in food processor until very fine.

In separate bowl, cream butter until fluffy, add sugar and beat for another minute.

Mix dry ingredients together in a separate bowl. Slowly add dry ingredients to butter-sugar mixture just until well combined. Gently fold in pecans and corn flakes.

Roll into 1" balls and bake at 350 degrees for about 15 minutes or until lightly browned.

*Can substitute 1/2 cup rose geranium leaves, 6 tsps ground lavender, or any other desired herb or spice. 2 tbsps finely chopped rosemary is great too.

Tortilla Rollups

1 8 oz package cream cheese

1 4 1/2 oz can chopped black olives

1 4 oz can chopped green chilies, rinsed, drained

3 - 4 green onions, chopped

Chives, Dill, Parsley (any or all)

8 - 10 flour tortillas

Unsalted butter, softened

Beat cream cheese until smooth. Stir in the olives, chilies, onions and herbs. Spread tortillas with a thin coat of butter and then spread with cheese mixture. Roll up, CHILL, slice. Serve at room temperature.
