A rose of great delicate beauty. The lemon yellow edged red buds unfurl to display double blooms of lemon yellow that are borne in clusters. In cool weather the petals will display red edging. They are sweetly fragrant. The foliage starts out with coppery tints and matures to a rich dark green and leathery foliage. An upright and yet spreading plant. Continual bloom,

Medium yellow shrub. the small, ovoid-pointed buds are lemon yellow (RHSCC 14C) tinted red opening to double (25-30 petals), shallow-cupped, 3-4 inch blooms of lemon yellow. In cool weather, reddish tints may occur. The blooms are borne in clusters of 5-10 and have a sweet fragrance. The abundant, leathery foliage is dark green with coppery-tints when young. The thorns are tan and awl-like. The erect, bushy plant is spreading to a height of 3 ft and blooms from June until killing frost.

Thomas Rivers called this rose "changeable as the chameleon". The full, very shapely flowers open with crimson outer petals and neat pink centers, then darken to solid crimson. The heat of the sun speeds the process: what appears to be a bi-color hedge in spring and fall will be all red roses in mid-summer. The neat, erect bush and constant bloom

Archduke (Archiduc) Charles - The 'Duke', a China, has been around prior to 1837 and blooms profusely with two to four inch blooms, delicately formed, with what has been described as a subtle 'banana' scent. Known as the 'chameleon' rose, the blooms are a rich pink, glowing rose and deep crimson changing with age, true to its China heritage. The three foot tall, four foot wide plant is compact, vigorous and leafy with good foliage. Known as the 'San Marcos Rose' to the Texas Rose Rustlers before it was properly identified, it was found growing all over the Central Texas area around old homesteads and in San Marcos in numerous locations. One group of Archduke Charles bushes were found under mounds of honeysuckle by the Burton's when they renovated the old Episcopal rectory built in the mid-1800's for their Benchmark Insurance office. (Growing in the same garden are 'Kay' which is believed to be Le Vesue and Hermosa.) Extremely shade, alkaline, and drought tolerant, he is a very handsome addition to any garden.

There is only a mild musky rose fragrance, but for this rose, the flower show more than makes up for it. There is short pause after the show-stopping first bloom flush, with repeat blooms all summer, and then a good second bloom flush in the fall.

Just about the most profuse blooming of all roses yet of restrained enough growth to fit into the smallest gardens. Hundreds of small pink single blooms with a white eye produced in huge clusters. The flowers cover the plant so densely one can hardly notice the foliage. Wonderful as a cut flower both on its own and in arrangements. Profuse blooming trusses composed of masses of small, single pink blooms with white centers. Fryers of England describes 'Ballerina' thus: "Huge trusses of flowers in hydrangea-like heads all summer long. The glorious pink blooms are a joy to behold, so light and dainty they give no idea of the weight of the bloom which clothes these attractive bushes. Trouble free with a variety of uses". One of the few roses bred by a woman and the most popular rose in the world. An eye-catching standout "Ballerina' fits perfectly into any garden design as well as rose and perennial beds. Excellent for landscaping. Always covered with its lovely blooms.

The flowers are freely produced throughout the growing season and are simply lovely with a rich, distinctive fragrance of their own.

First rose to be named a Texas Superstar™ and to receive prestigious EarthKind™ designation. Gorgeous shrub rose with large, fragrant and very double pink blossoms. Successive flushes of bloom spring to frost. So disease tolerant that fungicide sprays seldom required. Outstanding performance even in highly alkaline clay soils. A near perfect landscape rose. This rose is an excellent selection if you are looking for a rose that can be used as a cut flower to arrange in vases and display indoors. Belinda's Dream also makes a beautiful large container planting.

'Buff Beauty' can be seen climbing up a pillar, and used as a shrub. The very double flowers are the most beautiful shade of apricot and the new growth is dark red. The more established this rose becomes, the better its bloom. 'Buff Beauty' has some Noisette in its background, which is easily noted in its lovely fragrance.

Possibly one of the loveliest roses in any garden, R. 'Buff Beauty' has deep buff-gold coloured buds that open gold and then fade through yellow and buff to creamy white. The flowers are wonderfully shaped, becoming loose and open as they age. Always with a flower in the growing season, the main flush is so prolific the arching branches are quite weighed down. Another Hybrid Musks, 'Buff Beauty' is wonderful in the border, against a wall, or even as a pillar rose.

Prefers a sunny position although will withstand some shade. Plant in good soil, adding well-rotted compost to provide a good, loamy soil. Deadhead to encourage repeat flowering. Prune to remove dead-wood and control size where this is necessary.

Caldwell Pink' is a "found" rose, made popular by Dr. William Welch who obtained it from a small nursery near Caldwell, Texas. The rose was a gift from a family in Sommersville, Texas who grow the rose for many years. Some rosarians speculate it might actually be 'Pink Pet'. Since its reintroduction in the 1980's, it has become a popular rose with landscapers for its hardiness, ever blooming and disease resistant qualities. It is not very particular about soil conditions, but prefers a sunny open space.

Even though its origins are unclear, it is certain this is a wonderful rose with many great attributes. It blooms continuously from late spring through fall, bearing many clusters of double lilac-pink flowers. What they lack in fragrance they more than make up with an abundance of flowers. This rose grows into an attractive, full, small shrub, making it suitable for use in many landscape designs where full sun is available. The medium-green foliage remains disease-free throughout the growing season, thus requiring no sprays whatsoever. As a bonus, the foliage often turns reddish purple in the fall.

Caldwell Pink can be used in many landscape designs where a small shrub is needed. Use it in drifts, masses, or as an accent. It is naturally compact, so it will show best when used near the front of a mixed border of shrubs and perennial flowers. Its bright, lilac-pink flowers bloom in clusters, often producing 3 to 4 shoots bearing clusters of 20 to 50 or more 1 ½ inch flowers. Even though it does not set hips, new flowering shoots can be stimulated throughout the year by removing spent flower stalks back to a leaf below the multiple flowers stems.

(Katy Road Pink)

In the late 1970s or early 80's Dr. and Mrs. Stahl of Houston, Texas collected an outstanding rose near Katy, that soon became known as Katy Road Pink. Later, after further study, it has been determined that this selection is probably a Buck rose named 'Carefree Beauty'. Famed breeder Griffith Buck first released Carefree Beauty in 1977 but this rose has enjoyed much more popularity under the name Katy Road Pink than it did under its trademarked name.

Carefree Beauty forms large (4"-5"), light pink, semi-double blooms with up to 20 petals each. Flowering begins in spring and continues in cycles until first frost. These flowers open medium-light pink but colors are often more vivid in the cool weather of spring and fall. The color fades slightly to light pink as blooms age. The plant forms an upright shrub, 4' to 5' in height with medium sized, smooth, olive green foliage.

Carefree Beauty has a very well shaped form that creates an attractive accent for perennial borders and beds. This selection can be used in mass to create a breath taking sea of color or as a specimen plant providing a focal emphasis in the garden. Carefree Beauty also creates large hips which are an additional asset.

Forming an open, but extremely graceful bush, 'Carefree Beauty' appears to have few insect or disease problems and is not particular about soil or growing conditions. It is free blooming, probably one of the most floriferous pink roses, with new buds appearing all the time.

Suitable for pergolas and arches. Light pink semi-double flowers appear in clusters spring to fall. Slight fragrance is reminiscent of sweet peas. Semi-thornless.



This is the climbing sport of 'Old Blush'. The flowers are identical and like the shrub form, it blooms 11 months out of the year. It will grow 20' canes in one season, so be prepared with a sturdy structure! The growth is very vigorous, and it will need to be selectively pruned if you want it to look mannerly. Or you can just let it go for a truly wild look!

Deep pink shrub. Ovoid, medium-sized, rose red buds open to cupped, double rose-red flowers which age lighter. Flowers are borne several together on medium, strong stems and have a good lasting quality. Petals drop off cleanly and have a moderate clove scent. The foliage is abundant, dark green and leathery. The plants are erect, spreading, bushy to 60-75 cm. and in profuse bloom from late May to killing frost.

Good for hedges and mass plantings. It has lots of large hips. Remove "spent" blooms for best repeat bloom during summer. Let it go to hips in fall to have some interesting "fruit" on the bush when it isn't blooming.

Very resistant to disease.

Teddy Roosevelt made this rose his favorite, often wearing a bud or flower as a boutonniere. The cupped pink flowers have a cabbagey roundness to them, as if they were picked from a luscious old rose painting. Nearly continuously in bloom, these roses can be counted on for a rich whiff of fragrance at absolutely any time of the day, even in the hot Texas sun. The apple green leaves are slightly wavy.

Duchess de Brabant, also known as Comtesse de LaBarthe is a Tea that was introduced into commerce in 1857 and has received nothing but rave reviews since. Her cupped blooms have been described as salmon pink, pink shaded with carmine-rose, light silvery pink, peachy pink and shrimp pink. Teddy Roosevelt like the rose so much that he sported a fresh bud in his lapel each day. Known for her continuous supply of fragrant flowers from spring to frost. The shrub, described as moderately tall, compact, vigorous, hardy and healthy will grow to six feet tall and four feet across. It needs little care, able to survive a Texas drought with flying colors, blooming all the while. Wonderfully fragrant, cupped blooms a medium bright pink, with a hint of peach.

Name: Else Poulsen

Else Poulsen was introduced by Danish breeder S. Poulsen in 1924 as a cross of 'Orleans Rose' x 'Red Star'. Else Poulsen bears small 2" – 3" single, rose-pink flowers, each with approximately 10 petals. These flowers occur in clusters of 3-12 blooms each, on long stems, from early spring to first frost. This is a vigorously growing upright rose that reaches a mature size of 5" x 5". The foliage of Else Poulsen has an unusual bronze cast when young, with a glossy sheen.

This selection is best suited for use in background plantings. Else Poulsen is most frequently used in the landscape for the quantity of blooms and as an accent between other perennials and shrubs.

Name: Georgetown Tea

Height: 3 to 5 ft.

In 1983, Dr. William C. Welch, Professor and Extension Specialist at Texas A&M University, discovered this rose in the yard of a daycare center in Georgetown, Texas. It was a large healthy specimen but the owner knew nothing of its origins. Georgetown Tea is among several “found” roses that Dr. Welch is credited for re-introducing in to the rose community.

The double flowers are approximately 4” in diameter with a dark salmon pink center that fades to lilac pink. Georgetown Tea is a repeat bloomer from spring – first frost. Another interesting characteristic of this cultivar is that the petals become pointed at the tips, giving the open flower a star shape appearance. Like most roses in this class, the blooms have a Tea-like fragrance. The upright, bushy plant reaches a height of 3 – 5 feet with medium, dark green semi-glossy leaves.

Georgetown Tea is an excellent landscape rose requiring full sun for optimum growth and performance. Plants may be used in mass or as a specimen in the landscape. The flowers starry shape provides a unique appearance in the garden. These upright, bushy shrubs should be planted in a well drained soil on no less than 3’ – 5’ centers.

This little rose can be used in a variety of ways in your landscape. It works equally well in a container, as a small hedge or border, and as a specimen. The buds are pale pink and they open to off-white, semi-double flowers. The fragrance is quite delicious, too. The expected size of 'Marie Pavie' is about 3' to 4'. It blooms in cycles and the blooms tend to be mostly white in our heat. Some afternoon shade would help keep the blooms pink.

It is almost constantly in bloom and the wonderful scent permeates the garden on warm days. The foliage is a dark, rich, healthy green and the thornless stems of 'Marie Pavié' make this rose an outstanding landscape plant.

Name: Martha Gonzales

Bright scarlet, neat single flowers open flat to decorate a bushy shrub whose neat foliage has a dark red tinge. This is a handsome plant, and due to its size serves as an excellent choice for a low hedge or border. The original cuttings came from a Navasota gardener, Martha Gonzales, whose display of 'Mrs. Dudley Cross', 'Old Blush' and this rose could be seen from blocks away. 'Martha Gonzales' has become very popular with landscapers for mass plantings and large drifts

'Martha Gonzales' is a great hedge rose, staying a compact 3' tall. It is easily pruned with hedge clippers, but it will keep blooming even if you don't prune it. The new growth is especially pretty: the foliage has a dark red tinge to it, so even when it's out of bloom, it is still very colorful. It also makes a good container rose.

Only the best was good enough to be named after the wife of famous rose breeder and nurseryman, Benjamin Cant. This fat, full, cabbagey flower is a silver rose color with a dark rose reverse. The rich, cool fragrance is a treat, but the bush requires a little extra space; specimens can reach 8 feet in every direction. The bush needs pruning to keep it in bounds; give it plenty of space. A steady bloomer and a superb cut flower.

Its dark pink buds make it a beautiful cut flower. The cool tea fragrance is very evident in 'Mrs. B. R. Cant'.

This rose combines the best of cut flower excellence and a cool, deep Tea fragrance. Fat, full cabbage-type flowers are silvery medium pink with a dark rose reverse. 6 - 8 ft. x 8 ft. Excellent repeater. This is a popular, reliable and successful Tea rose that has stood the test of time. It is vigorous and easy to grow.

Name: Nearly Wild

Height: 3' to 4' tall

The blooms on this rose will remind you of apple blossoms. The flowers are single, meaning only 5 petals, and are rose-pink in color. It is a compact bush, so can be planted close together if you want to make a hedge. It is also very beautiful planted in mass. It is compact, full and almost always in bloom. The estimated size is 3' to 4' tall.

'Nearly Wild' likely got its name from its close resemblance to Iowa's state flower, the wild species rose. Like our beloved wild rose, this hybrid has single flowers with bright pink petals and white centers.

Wild roses are beautiful in their native habitat, however, 'Nearly Wild' is a more desirable landscape plant because it begins blooming in early June and continues blooming nearly non-stop throughout the season. It also has a more compact growth habit, growing only three feet tall and two feet wide. These characteristics make it a very versatile landscape plant. It is attractive as a specimen plant among shrubs or in a perennial border. It also is successful as a low hedge, container plant or ground cover.

Name: Old Blush

Also known as ‘Common Monthly’, ‘Common Blush China’, ‘Old Pink Daily’, ‘Old Pink Monthly’, and ‘Parsons’ Pink China’, the myriad of names of this semi-double hybrid of *R. chinensis* attest to the friendly familiarity with which it has been grown for over two hundred years. One of the most common of old roses, it is also one of the most valuable, for it has passed on its incredible blooming prowess to countless cultivars during the history of hybridization in the West. ‘Old Blush’ has medium, semi-double, lilac pink flowers in loose clusters. They flush darker pink in the sun and are followed by large orange hips. It blooms so steadily that it is not a very good cut flower: the blossoms drop quickly to make room for their successors. The bush is full and upright in habit, growing slowly to over 5 feet, with neat, healthy foliage. Perfume is soft, but fruity and pleasant. Whether used in a hedge (which can be spectacular), as a specimen, or in a border, ‘Old Blush’ should be treated simply as a flowering shrub and not fussed over

When in full bloom it covers itself with small deep red, fully double flowers. Red Cascade has both *R. wichurana* and *R. roxburghii* in its ancestry. It will make a very nice groundcover or is excellent for trailing over the sides of a pot or planter. It is outstanding when grown in a hanging basket. Always in bloom.

Red Cascade does just what its name implies and that is cascade a carpet of one inch red blooms from cane tips in elongated "Finger" clusters from May through December. This is a rose that you can grow in a terraced rock garden or as a ground cover. Rose rustlers in Houston who grow it, have been known to mow it! In the Texas Hill Country it grows just fine, clambering out of a limestone rock on the down-side of a hill. It was introduced in 1976 as a weeping miniature and has also been trained as a climber. This has to be one of the more versatile roses for the landscape!

This versatile rose can be grown as a mannerly climber or, because of its semi-prostrate habit, can be grown as a trailer. The choice is yours. Double, creamy-white flowers of slight fragrance handsomely decorate the dark, glossy foliage of this vigorous rose. It is a perfect candidate for a white garden because the lovely blooms reflect light well at night. This cultivar also produces beautiful orange-red hips in fall. This non-patented cultivar is easily rooted from cuttings.

Sombreuil' is a hardy, but thorny, climbing white Tea. The blooms are large, flat and very double. It has a delicious Tea fragrance. It is a good rose to train up a pillar or on a fence.

This lush, very double rose was well described by Rivers as a "pillar Noisette with very large, pale flowers inclining to fawn colour in the center, a very fragrant, beautiful and distinct rose." The color we note tends to be more creamy white. The cupped flowers are large, double and Tea scented. The canes are tinged purple while the foliage is a bright green and holds for some time. It can be grown as a handsome shrub as well as a pillar rose.

Here's another rose that some believe to be the true 'Hume's Tea Scented China.' Right or wrong this rose produces the palest of pink, tea-like blooms on a 3 to 4 foot thick bush. The plant is twiggy in growth, more like our China roses and can mildew a little in the early spring. The flowers are good for cutting and have an unusual fragrance that probably earned it its name.

Spice is classified as a Bermuda Mystery rose due to its unknown parentage. But there's no mystery about its performance. Spice produces wave after wave of blush pink, double blossoms that have a tea-like fragrance. Many knowledgeable rosearians believe that Spice is the true 'Hume's Tea Scented China,' (1809) and along with Parks Yellow tea-scented China (1824) parented a long list of modern cultivars including Hybrid Teas.

Orange pink shrub. The long, ovoid-pointed buds open to single (615 petals), flat. 4-4.5 inch blooms of geranium lake (RHSCC 47D) which age to light Empire rose (RHSCC 48D). The blooms, borne singly and in clusters of 2-25, have a moderately spicy, clove fragrance. The abundant, leathery foliage is dark green and slightly scented when young. The large thorns are russet and awl-like. The erect, bushy, 5 ft plant is moderately vigorous and blooms from June until killing frost.

Just the rose for those of you who like single, 5-7 petals, blooms. The coloring is superb and clean, pure orange-pink. The blooms come in clusters and are produced in great numbers. 'Summer Wind' is well foliated with dark, leathery green leaves which provide a perfect backdrop for the striking blooms. As an added benefit, both the flowers and the foliage are fragrant.
