



Wizzie's Wonderful World of Insects

Scorpions

Scorpions are arachnids with eight legs and two body regions. Scorpions also have two pincers or claws, called pedipalps, which help them hold their prey as they eat. They also have a long tail with a stinger on the tip that is used for defense or to paralyze prey.

The most common scorpion in Central Texas is the striped bark scorpion. This scorpion is yellowish-tan with two dark stripes that run along the back. Striped bark scorpions get up to $2\frac{1}{2}$ in length.

Scorpions can be found under rocks, logs or landscaping material as well as in woodpiles or in homes. When working outside, leather gloves should be worn to avoid being stung.

Striped bark scorpions are capable of stinging, but only cause moderate reactions for most people. Ice packs can be placed on the sting area to reduce pain and swelling. A person stung by a scorpion should be watched closely for several hours following the incident to ensure that an allergic reaction does not manifest. If breathing difficulties or hives occur, seek immediate medical attention.

To help keep scorpions from moving into the home, try the following:



- Remove debris (including firewood) away from the home
- Prune any trees or shrubs that touch or overhang the house
- Replace weather stripping as needed around doors or windows
- Stuff weep holes with copper mesh
- Seal cracks & crevices and/or pipe penetrations with sealant
- Treat the foundation of the home with a pesticide labeled for outside use and scorpions

Let's Talk Tools!

Patricia Shirey of the Austin Day Spa and KLRU's Central Texas Gardener spoke to us about garden

tools at the November General meeting. Many of these tools would make great Christmas gifts! Patricia gave us a list of her favorite tools and where to find them. The tool tote pictured here was filled with everything you would



need while wandering around your garden. She rec-



ommends Felco Shears. Felco is a bit pricier than a lot of pruning shears, but she's had hers for 30 years. Felco sells parts to the shears when they wear out and has a set that has a swivel handle and one specifically for lefties.

She brought in a pile of little trees she pulled out with her Lawn Jaws and Puller Bear in just 30 minutes. (I have a Lawn Jaws and it really saves your hand!) She The photo of gets her tomato cages from www.tomatocage.com. These are made of galvanized steel and are collapsible, but are quite pricey. However, again, she's had hers for 30 years. Patricia reminded us to replace washers in hoses every year and to store insecticidal soap, ant bait, BT, etc. inside. Patricia's son gave her a reciprocating saw with a pruning blade that will cut 4 -5 inch branches and a metal cutting blade that will cut rebar. This is one of her favorite tools. She suggested looking for hose couplings in the Pro watering



section of Home Depot and using old grapefruit bags to put weeds in to dip into garbage pails of water for compost tea. Paint your tool handles pink, ladies, and a contractor or husband won't walk off with them!

All in all an entertaining and informative talk.

- 1. The Herb Study has for several years had a winter Herbal Tea. We decided that a Tea in January was a perfect time. Often held on a Thursday morning from about 10 to 12 in a home. The cost of the Herbal Forum is about \$75 and there are optional workshops on Friday. 
Llano Earth Art Fest
