
## **Fungus Gnats**

Fungus gnat adults are small, black, long-legged flies with long antennae. Most adults are about 1/16 of an inch but some can get up to ½ an inch. They are weak fliers and generally remain near potted plants, growing media, foliage or leaf litter.

Larvae, or immatures, have a black head capsule and

long whitish body without legs. They feed on organic matter such as mulch, compost, grass clippings, plant roots and fungi. When conditions are very moist, fungus gnat larvae



can become abundant and may leave slime trails on media that looks similar to trails left by snails or slugs.

While these gnats are a nuisance they are fairly easy to manage. Indoors, it is a good idea to use yellow sticky cards as a monitoring tool. Potato pieces may also be used as a monitoring tool for fungus gnats. Imbed a peeled potato cube into media and inspect the underside of the potato and the media directly below it twice a week for fungus gnat larvae.

To manage fungus gnat populations, work on reducing excessively moist conditions. Avoid overwatering and make sure that there is good drainage. The surface of container soil should be allowed to dry before watering again.

If using compost, make sure that items have been fully composted. Compost piles should be turned regularly and kept away from doors or windows. Inspect all doors, windows, vents and screens for a good seal to reduce the number of gnats that may enter a structure.

In homes, insecticides are rarely needed to manage fungus gnats. If they are needed, *Bacillus thuringiensis* var. *israelensis* or the nematode *Steinernema* 

feltiae can be applied in containers to control larvae. Either spray on the media or apply as a soil drench. Biologicals work best when they are applied early in an infestation. If a population is already large, they may not provide the control desired.

Happy New Year fellow Master Gardeners! Here we are in a brand-new year starting out our gardening events. Right off the bat, most of the gardening events are in Austin or around the Dallas area.

I found several events through the **Texas Smartscape**. They are offering:

**Backyard Composting** will be offered on January 9, 2016 from 9 to 11 AM it's free.

Organic Vegetable Gardening which will be on January 12, 2016 from 7:00 PM to 8:30 PM. This event is also free. They are offering Success with Seeds that will be January 14, 2016 from 7 PM to 8:30 PM this is another free event.

January 25 there will be a **Container Gardening** event and it will be from 6:30 PM through 8:30 PM and it is free.

On January 28 through February 25, 2016 there will be a **Master Composter Training**. It is a free event and it's held from 7 PM to 9:30 PM.

If you're interested in getting more information, you can check out their website www.txsmartscape.com.

In Austin, at the sustainable food center, there are several classes.

The next class is going to be a class preview night which is January 12, 2016 from 5pm through 7 PM.

There's a **Break It Down Essential Knife Skills class** on January 20, 2016 from 6:30 PM to 8:30 PM and **Caring for Fruit Trees** January 23, 2016 from 10 AM to 12 PM. They will be offering **Butchery for the Home** cook series package on January 26, 2016 that will run through February 2, 2016. On February 2, 2016 they will have **Understanding Meat.** 

They will be holding several very interesting classes and on February 13 they get into **an Introduction to Food Gardening.** If you're interested in any of these classes you can go to their website at substainable-foodcenter.org.

At Zilker botanical Gardens there will be a compost Saturday. It will be January 9, 2016 from 10 AM to 12 PM. It's at the Zilker Botanical Gardens located at 2220 Barton Springs Rd., Austin, TX. Zilker Park entrance fee is two dollars per adult one dollar per child ages 3 to 12 or the senior age 62 and over three dollars for non-Austin residents cash or check is accepted. You can get more information at the Texas A&M tag life extension service. Travis county, 512-854-9600, is going to have a Texas First Detector class on Saturday, February 6, 2016. "See something, say something"...

Finally here are some of events closer to home, the Harker Heights community garden located at 400 Miller's Crossing in Harker Heights. Citizens of Harker Heights and the surrounding areas can rent plots to plant fruit trees, vegetables, flowers, herbs. Members of the Garden Committee are given an exclusive combination to the garden locks to enter between sunrise and sunset. The garden provides access to water with the hoses, a compost tumbler and a shed for storing personal gardening tools.

They will also be offering gardeners education series. This is going to be held at the activity center at 400 Indian trails Monday from 6 PM to 7 PM. Topics will be Spring Garden Planting and Square-foot Gardening and that will be January 11, 2016. On February 8, 2016 they will be offering a class on Trees of Central Texas. It will be holding a Seed Swap Saturday, January 23, 2016 from 1 PM to 2:30 PM at the activity center on 400 Indian Trail. This free event allows the general public to bring in seeds, bulbs, and/ or cuttings to share or swap (No hybrid seeds please). Please make sure that the seeds are clearly labeled and in an envelope, baggie, or container. Label should include the name of the plant, growing directions, and a picture of the plant if possible. It is not mandatory to bring something to swap. Baggies will be provided for take-home seeds. There will be gardening related vendors at the event to share information about gardening, their businesses, and to answer any gardening questions.
