

Seed Saving with Williamson County MG's

Jane Van Praag and I went to the Seed Saving class held by Williamson County Master Gardeners on October 27th in Georgetown. The room was totally full. The speaker was Jane LaComette, who gave us some of her personal seeds. It was well worth the trip. Williamson County Extension agent, Kate Whitney, helped to pull it all together.

Jane and I both discussed the benefit that Bell County would provide our citizens by having a similar class some evening next year that is open to the public for their own education on how to save their own seeds. We were considering doing this project ourselves, so there were a few observations I wanted to make. Since seeds can sometimes disguise themselves pretty well, a refresher wasn't a bad idea.

Most interesting was how to save tomato and other moist seeds inside whatever vegetable they came in, even sliced tomatoes. Plus we got some good bonus seeds to take home.

The first hour was spent educationally - many had no idea where the seeds were on the plants. The second hour was spent walking through their own garden outside their office. Apparently Texas A&M used the grounds for a while, so they were most helpful in establishing plans for each of their areas in their gardens: Drought, Vegetables, Roses, and Orchards. People who attended were welcomed to pick seeds directly off their plants.

By now you know, we'll be saving seeds from our own yards. They'll need to be dried, chaff removed, and labeled. Bringing them to future monthly meetings will be a big help. Many reasons for packaging them up is for events where Bell County Master Gardeners appear:

- The VA Hospital Suicide Stand Down had men pouring over the one variety of bagged seeds, in hopes of finding some other varieties to plant. I had bagged up only one type of seed from my own collection Esperanza seeds that another MG had given me. Over 110 packets were taken. After witnessing the disappointment over no varieties available, it became evident that pushing our Seed Saving Project was essential, so we can offer more to the public. That's an education that they'll learn on their own. But, I do look forward to hearing anyone's comments from trying.
- In January, there is a Plant Swap in Killeen. Melinda Arriola was the first to request packaged seeds to have available at the BCMG table.
- JMG events. Rather humbling to see children become thrilled over being able to take a package of seeds home to plant in their own yards.

- Obviously, even the Mother Earth Expo in Belton would find a lengthy line to our bowl of free seeds. It would have to have a limited quantity.
- One of the mentors of the new class asked if they could have some seeds, too. Absolutely! What a treat it would be to learn how well they did growing them on their own from the seeds they received at the beginning of their experience of becoming a Bell County Master Gardener.
- Carol Morisset would be welcomed to have a bowl at each of the future Thursday night monthly classes if she's interested.
- Power Point talks around the county would be an ideal opportunity to have some seeds available. Kim Pringle will be giving a talk to the Temple Garden Club in January, another opportunity.
- Naturally, any BCMG member would be more than welcomed to take a look at what we've collected should any one be interested.
- This list can go on and on. All it would take, once the seeds are packaged up, would be to put them in a bowl near the sign in sheets... ready and available for people to see them.

Thank you for bringing any dried and cleaned seeds to future meetings. All time spent on harvesting, cleaning the chaff off the dried seeds is available to collect time for the VMS website. Just make sure they have an identifying label. It's an easy way to spend a couple of hours while watching TV. I hope to have a surprise or two for those sweethearts coming to help this Wednesday. This reminds me of the times we'd spend over the potting bench, for those who remember it, methodically working and being able to visit at the same time is a good opportunity to learn more about the plants from those who actually grew them. I hope this event repeats itself several times this next year. As needed, Scarlot will broadcast the date for anyone wanting to come help again. It will obviously depend upon how quickly our seeds disappear.

Should you ever see anyone huddled around the bowl of available seeds, pause for a moment and talk to them - possibly to suggest that more than 3 varieties of seeds would be difficult to care for if they will be trying to grow all of them from seed. You can also add some good advice with regards to the ones they selected. Likewise, inviting them to come to our Plant Sales. It all goes toward a good cause.

But, he was so cold, how could I leave him behind. He was almost frozen stiff and couldn't move.

I believe that God, in all his wisdom, watches over his creation as well as he watches over us. As he put us in charge of them, maybe God will smile upon me one day when I need the same break.
