The President's Corner

Upgrades to the Learning Center and Greenhouse are complete and both facilities are fully functional. Now all we need to do is establish procedures for their utilization. We owe Paul Carter a huge Thanks for all the hard work he put into this project and for seeing it through to the end.

Last month at our monthly General Membership Meeting we discussed the status of our Strategic Action plan which was approved this past January. Here is a recap of that discussion for those of you who may have missed the Goal 5: Develop and position New Class meeting:

Goal 1: Manage active BCMGA membership to accomplish the annual target goals as listed.

- 2018 @ 139,
- 2019 @ 150,
- 2020 @ 171,
- 2021 @ 192,
- 2022 @ 213,
- 2023 @ 234

We exceeded the 2019 goal and reached a membership total of 155 as of August. At the present rate of growth, we will easily attain our tion support of Bell County school and youth goal of 200+ in the year 2022.

Goal 2: Maintain the Master Gardener Learning Center to meet the organizations current and future needs taking special attention to current and future growth, and...

Goal 3: Develop the Greenhouse facility as an increasingly utilized asset to support the organization.

These two goals are listed together since upgrades to both facilities were addressed simultaneously and recently completed. Now we must evaluate how best to utilize these facilities to meet the needs of the organization as well as the public.

Goal 4: Maintain and develop strong Member and Community Outreach Education.

The monthly Community Outreach classes continue to be popular with members and the public alike. Effective September 19th, classes will be held in the newly renovated Learning Center. We do not anticipate a need to turn anyone away as the capacity in this facility is at least 85-90 attendees.

- The organization will host its first Central Texas Home Lawn, Landscape, and Garden Conference at the Expo Center next spring.

- The New Class has met several times to develop the curriculum and training needs of the New Master Gardener class of 2020.
- Enrollment is limited to 20. This number seems to be ideal and enables increased interaction as well as more "hands on" presentations.
- Classes will be presented by instructors from TAMU as well as our own Master Gardener members.

Goal 6: Develop and focus Youth Educaprograms such as Math/Science Days, Science Fairs and Horticultural related programs.

Goal 7: Landscape/ Grounds committee will continue to augment educational activities of the BCMGA by maintaining and enhancing the grounds of the BCMGA Texas AgriLife center through the noted activities.

- Plans are under way to repair and upgrade the existing irrigation system and a Master Site plan is in the works.
- Improvements are being made to demonstration beds and some landscape plants have been identified. However, work in this

 area is not progressing as well as expected and more emphasis should be placed on planting, labeling, and more native plants in the landscape. It is hoped the new Master Gardener interns will take up this work as one of their projects and help us get this goal accomplished next year.

Goal 8: The Plant Sale Committee will continue to develop and maintain the Spring and Fall plant sale to generate income for the BCMGA and act as a source of education to the public.

• The public continues to enjoy the Spring and Fall plant sales. These events have become so successful that the organization has found it necessary to relocate them to the Expo Center to accommodate the everincreasing number of attendees. This new location will enhance safety, improve customer service, and lead to a more efficient and enjoyable experience. The 2020 Plant sale will be held in conjunction with the Central Texas Home Lawn, Landscape, and Garden Conference on March 7th.

Special note: Lyle has been briefed as to the status of this plan and he appreciates the level of detail taken in our report. He is particularly proud of our Outreach Programs. However, as indicated above we continue to receive requests for presenters and support in various educational programs. When deciding to support these various requests we must carefully evaluate whether we have all the resources to meet the client's needs. We must not over burden the select few members who willingly and happily agree to participate without thinking of themselves. This will only lead to member burn-out, and it must not be allowed to happen. Please look in VMS and, if you have the time and energy, volunteer for some of these very rewarding and fun educational projects and programs.

Did You Know?

Raised Bed Gardening, What is it?

The answer seems intuitive to me, but a recent discussion led me to believe it might not be so intuitive to everyone. A gardener I was talking to was using a no-till modified "lasagna garden" method and had placed 4" of compost on top of the native soil, and then covered that with 8" or more of arborist wood chips. When I said this was a form of raised bed gardening, I was told "no, this was lasagna gardening, not raised bed gardening.

So, what is raised bed gardening? The best all-encompassing definition that I could find is that "a raised bed garden is a garden built on top of your native soil, sometimes incorporating native soil, sometimes not. These gardens can be contained, such as when you build a wood or stone structure to keep the bed intact, or they can be more free form, with soil and amendments merely piled several inches high on top of the native soil." Simply put, a raised bed is where the growing medium, whatever that is, is on top of the native soil. The growing medium, however that is assembled, does not define whether the bed is raised or not.

The advantages of using raised beds for the home gardener in Bell County are numerous, but probably the most important reason is our native soil is very alkaline and not great for vegetable gardening. It is extremely difficult to amend alkaline soil to get the pH into the desirable range of 6.5-7.0 for most vegetables, so building beds on top of the native soil is the easiest way to avoid using native soil. There is also a growing body of scientific evidence that tilling the soil disrupts micro and macro organisms that are critical for developing a good gardening medium. Tilling also leads to more soil compaction, which impedes the flow of water and air in the bed. Beds designed for adult gardeners should not be wider than 4', so that the center of the bed can be reached from the side without walking on the soil. If the raised bed is not contained with fixed sides, then most beds are 3' wide with 6" of sloping soil on each side.

By the way, the use of arborist wood chips, as the gardener I was talking to did, is an excellent way to build a fertile soil. It does take some time for the decomposition to occur, and the layer of compost below the wood chips helps shorten that time. Planting is done by pulling the wood chip mulch aside and planting directly into the underlying compost. If you don't place a layer of compost down first, then you will need to wait at least 6 months for enough decomposition to have occurred to create a growing medium for your plants.

VA Suicide Stand Down

The Temple Daily Telegram described our efforts at the 7th annual Suicide Stand Down event as follows: "Bell County Master Gardeners were out in full force, behind tables that ran the length of the covered valet parking area at the Olin E. Teague Veterans' Administration Medical Center in Temple." Twenty-one Master Gardeners worked the event on Wednesday, September 25th from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Our members grew and donated over 500 plants ranging in size from 4" to 5 gallon and the Association purchased an additional 200+ vegetables, herbs and succulents. Many of these were used in the 6 ongoing demos given by various members to 290+ veteran attendees. Overall 630+ veterans came to our tables to receive free plants of their choice along with pots and soil. One hundred and forty 10" pots, over 90 one gallon pots along with 400+ bags of 1 quart and 1 gallon bags of soil were given with each plant or group of plants adopted by each vet. Members too numerous to list donated plants and pots, purchased some of our herbs and vegetables, donated their time to up-pot plants, clean and prep the plants before the event and transport them to the VA. Of the donated transplants, easily 2/3 were grown by our members. Awesome thanks to Claudette Hawkins, easily the grand champion of propagators for her 250 colorful and various coleus plants! A special thanks to the Seed Savers group who collected and packaged seeds as giveaways.


