July 2013 Plant ID by Blanco County Texas
Master Gardener **Chris DeBremaecker**

Common Name: Damianita
Scientific Name: Chrysactinia mexicana

Family: Asteraceae (Aster Family)

Form: Mounded, bushy, low growing 1-2 ft
perennial shrub.



Habitat: Caliche or limestone outcrops or well-
draining sand or loam


Leaves: Leaves crowded on the twigs, dark green,
up to 3/8 inch long by 1/16 inch or less wide,
covered with green to black glandular dots visible
under a 10x hand lens. Leaves are also aromatic.



Flowers: Vivid yellow, fragrant composite flowers
about 1 inch across bloom cheerfully from April
through September.



Seeds: Collect from dry flower heads in the fall to
sow in the spring. 1/8th inch long



Requirements: Excellent drainage, sun, dry
conditions.

Maintenance: Very drought tolerant. Prune if you want to shape the plant. Older plants can take on a gnarly appearance.

Wildlife: Provides cover, nesting site, and nectar to insects along with high deer resistance!

Uses: Excellent as a border plant or ground cover in challenging hot areas. Used more for its flower qualities than its shrub attribute.

Blanco Fair Time


