A Note From Cindy - Everyone, please take a look at your flower beds for extra plants for the Plant Sale. Many of them may have babies or re-sprouted and can be potted up for the sale. Now and the next few weeks is a great time to pot the plants. This will give them time to recoup and look great by sale time. Please let me know what kind of and how many plants you will have, so we can get a description in the brochure. If you need 1 gallon pots, there are plenty in the greenhouse for use. If you let me know, I will bring some to the next meeting for you.

Work Days - March 28 (Friday) and April 2 (Wednesday) - We will meet at the Greenhouse for final transplanting and trimming of plants for the sale. We have done so well that we have to move up some of the plants to quarts!

April 9 (Wednesday) - Treesearch will deliver plants to the Extension Office. We will advise on the time of arrival. A trailer and people are needed for the unloading of the plants.

In The Garden:

New Fungicide Cleared for Use on Blackberries and Strawberries - The 2003 edition of E-17 "Fruit and Nut Disease Control Products for Use in Texas" is available online only. The website address is: http://tcebookstore.org/browse.cfm?catid=123. A new fungicide cleared for use on blackberry and strawberry is Cabrio®®, a BASF product that contains the active ingredient pyraclostrobin. Pyraclostrobin is in a class of fungicides called strobilurins. At least three chemical companies are developing these type compounds. Strobilurins are broad spectrum fungicides with low mammalian toxicity (very safe). Other strobilurin fungicides on the market are 1) kresoxim - methyl (Sovran®®, Cygnus®®); 2) azoxystrobin (Abound®®, Quadris®®, Heritage®®); and 3) trifloxystrobin (Flint®®, Gem®®, Compass).

Now, what is significant about Cabrio? It may help control rosette on blackberry. Rosette is a fungal disease that causes sterility and has been extremely difficult to control with fungicides. Current research has shown Abound to be highly effective, but it is not cleared for use on blackberries. Since Cabrio is similar to Abound, it may prove effective for rosette.

Oak Tree Death Subsided Just As Predicted - During the drought years of 1998-2000, Hypoxylon canker was responsible for killing numerous red and post oaks in East Texas. Since Hypoxylon Canker is a stress related disease, watering during drought stress is the only means of control.

Most trees show no sign or symptom of being infected. Once symptoms develop, death is quick and sure. Death is so sudden leaves stay attached. Rainfall amounts and distribution have been normal the past two years. Subsequently, Hypoxylon Canker has subsided. With the good rainfall so far this year, 2003 should be another light year for the disease.

Fire Blight on Pear - Fire blight incidence has been light to moderate the past two years following epidemic levels in 1999 and 2000. 2003 will probably be a repeat of the past two years. No prolonged, warm event took place in January or February, which is often responsible for triggering fire blight. However, cloudy, wet conditions have prevailed leading up to bloom. I would be more concerned if the wet conditions were coupled with warmer temperatures. Warmer and dry weather will hasten and shorten the bloom period. The fire blight bacterium is spread during bloom, so the shorter the bloom time the better. The long range forecast for March is below average temperatures and above average rainfall.
