



## BEE in the Know- Heat Exhaustion

If you suspect heat exhaustion:

Untreated, heat exhaustion can lead to heatstroke, which is a life-threatening condition. If you suspect heat exhaustion, take these steps immediately:

- Move the person out of the heat and into a shady or air-conditioned place.
- Lay the person down and elevate the legs and feet slightly.
- Remove tight or heavy clothing.
- Have the person sip chilled water, a decaffeinated sports drink containing electrolytes or other nonalcoholic beverage without caffeine.
- Cool the person by spraying or sponging with cool water and fanning.
- Monitor the person carefully.

Contact a health care provider if signs or symptoms worsen or if the person doesn't improve after taking first-aid measures.

Call 911 or your local emergency number if the person's condition gets worse, especially if he or she experiences:

- Fainting
- Agitation
- Confusion
- Seizures
- Inability to drink

## June Horticulture Hero: Sandy Henderson

Here is what the nominator said about our June Horticulture Hero:

I would like to nominate Sandy Henderson as a Horticulture Hero.

1. Sandy is an invaluable member of the Herb Garden Committee, which currently consists of 2 members! She is constantly cleaning up weeds from the various sections of the Herb Garden, as most of the weeds in Brazoria County end up this very fertile garden (since it is so highly composted)! It's chore every week to deal with all the weeds, but Sandy takes it in stride and just gets to work. She spent a lot of time earlier this year putting compost and mulch into all of the sections.
2. Besides weeds, she continually cleans up some of the garlic chives that seem to take over the herb beds. These weeds have very deep roots that and it takes quite a bit of effort to dig them out. It's a constant battle to keep the garlic chives at bay before they take over all of the beds.
3. Sandy gets her herbs planted early each season and grows a number herself in the greenhouse from seed. Last fall, along with her husband Al, she grew lots of vegetables as well, which she gave out to many of the master gardeners (I know I received several great tomato plants, some which are still doing well in May 2023). Sandy also makes sure her plants are labelled in the Herb Garden.
4. She's eager to discuss information about any of the Herbs growing in the garden and to let other MG's or visitors know which grow well, taste good, don't taste good, culinary uses.
5. Earlier this year, the irrigation system for the Herb bed had leaks and not only did Sandy facilitate getting it fixed, but constructed the instructions for the system, including printing and placing them by the controller as well as getting those instructions placed on the BCMGA website. She has taken on the responsibility for monthly maintenance and checking the irrigation system regularly.
6. Anytime Sandy reports an issue with the Herb Garden, the very next text or email is how it's been fixed.
7. She also facilitates getting help from her husband Al to help in the Herb Garden, even though he has a myriad of responsibilities in other BEES locations. He is an honorary member of the Herb Garden and planted some really beautiful zinnias in an unused area.
8. This past spring, Sandy helped for many hours with the Tree and Plant sales. There were several pictures of her on Facebook helping with the sales in both the prep work as well as on actual sales days.
9. If anyone needs help, she will stop what she is doing to help them. I've personally observed this on several occasions and have also been a beneficiary of these actions.
10. A couple of years ago, a young female cat showed up at BEES. She gave it water and she stayed with the cat until I was able to go to the store and bring back some food. (fortunately, the cat was taken later that day to an animal shelter).
11. In April and May, wild sunflowers took over many of the Row Garden beds. Sandy helped remove those plants, so the vegetables could get light. She has other rows she helps manage, so it was awesome of her to help others get their rows in better shape. This is a daunting task as the roots of these sunflowers are somewhere in Asia.
12. I'm probably forgetting a lot, but all in all she makes for a great working partner in the BEES Herb Garden.
