

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

Lastly, many trees are starting to drop leaves which is basically a survival mechanism for them. The number of leaves a tree has dictates how much water the tree needs. Less leaves = less water. In other situations, the leaves are browning or burning which means the leaf does not have enough water to transpire out to cool itself and hence the sun is causing the leaves to burn up.

#### WHY NOW?

- Many of these limbs are simply losing their elasticity, especially the dry ones up in the trees. The intense heat and lack of rain has dried them out to the point where gravity takes over and they are coming down. This can also happen when these same limbs get laden with water and become super heavy then come down. Often hypoxylon canker can be found on such limbs, but many times this fungus is merely secondary and not the cause of the problem.
- Some apparent, healthy limbs are also falling which again car be attributed to lack of water and perhaps a heavy crop of pecans and/or acorns. In most cases, there is not much we could have done to prevent this other than to apply additional water. This is often not possible due to water restrictions.
- There are other limbs that are falling due to having a weak area in the bark. You will note this by looking at where the limb came off the tree and seeing weak bark and dead wood These are situations that are beyond our control and that we

#### **Agent's Corner**



It's a scorcher out there, but that's no reason to waste water when watering your lawn.

The cycle and soak method of applying water to the landscape drastically reduces and in some cases eliminates runoff.

This method of applying water to the landscape is made up of multiple cycles for each station with 30 to 60 minute for the water to soak into the soil between cycles.

- 1. The first cycle will break the surface tension of the soil and saturate the top layer of soil.
  - 2. The second cycle infiltrates the soil more efficiently and deeply after the first cycle.
- 3. A third, and sometimes a fourth cycle, is beneficial if a slope is involved or if runoff occurs after the sprinklers run for just a few minutes.

For example: if you have determined you need to run a sprinkler station 12 minutes, schedule your controller run the station 2 times for 6 minutes, or 3 cycles for 4 minute. If a slope or runoff is involved, run the station 4 cycles 3 minutes.
