- DREAM Garden: President, Yvonne Sparks, announced that the board of directors decided that HCMGA will no longer support the DREAM garden as of October. The mission of the garden (Demonstrate, Research, Educate, Apply and Maintain) was met and exceeded, but it has been determined that it no longer meets that mission. The tools, sign, Rick Hirsch Memorial stone, and bench were relocated.

- Board Meetings were held virtually until in-person meetings resumed in September
- Regular Meetings were suspended due to COVID-19 until October

- Plant Sale was canceled. Plants were taken to Holder Hill Farm to be sold with a portion of the proceeds benefiting HCMGA
- Intern class created a video on flower arrangements for teaching purposes and post it online

- The "Spring Conference" was moved on the calendar and became the "Fall Conference". The fundraising event was held at the Athens Country Club. The speaker was Neil Sperry, a name synonymous with Texas gardening since 1970. His topic was "Facts and Fantasies of Texas Gardening: An Evening with Neil Sperry"
- Texas Master Gardener Association celebrates their 40th anniversary
- HCMGA added capabilities for the online purchase of tickets and registration to various events.

2018 Continued

- The role of HCMGA in the Children's Garden program transitioned to a more "consultant" type
 position. It changed from HCMGA volunteers doing the planning, leading, physical labor, and
 teaching to HCMGA volunteers providing information and encouragement to teachers wanting help
 with gardening projects.
- The intern class created The Monthly Gardening Guide over 80 spiral-bound pages filled with pictures and gardening information geared specifically for our area. It has been very successful and is now in its second printing.
- HCMGA moved to obtain a permit from the State for selling plants at the annual Plant Sale. The
 Texas Nursery license will enable HCMGA to grow, sell plants, and buy wholesale.
- HCMGA explored requirements for hosting an Advanced MG Training workshop in 2019
- Improvements to the Greenhouse and its operations continued. By the end of the year, old shade cloth, weeds, and overgrown plants had been removed and new shelving, tables, and grow lights were in place. New procedures were established to benefit the health of the plants. The Greenhouse and the Plant Sale became more formally linked together.
- A partnering agreement was established between HCMGA and Henderson County Regional Fairpark for the Harvest Garden and a groundbreaking ceremony was held.
- Wayne Stafford, a member of HCMGA's first MG class, passed away in December. Wayne was also
 the only member from the original master gardener class that had maintained continuous
 certification. Plans are in the works to nominate him to Emeritus status.
