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Office Help

I hear it all the time. "I don't like answering the phone at the extension office." It's important to realize however, that this is the number one reason that the Master Gardener program was created. In rural counties, spring gardening questions drive them crazy because nobody in the office went to school to study horticulture. On the other hand, in urban offices, spring gardening questions drive them crazy because of the sheer numbers of them. When I worked in Dallas and San Antonio, there were three phone lines dedicated to horticulture alone. Smith County falls somewhere in between the rural and the urban counties in regards

to the number of gardening questions. But in modern times, the phone inquiries are only part of the mix, so I certainly need your help as regularly as possible.

In addition to phone calls, we also get gardening questions from walk in visitors and via e-mail and Facebook. This is why most urban Master Gardener groups staff a "help desk" to handle them.

My problem in the springtime is the mass quantity of folks wanting my time, and not near enough hours in the day or days in the week to get to them all. This is why despite being an avid gardener, spring is my least favorite time of the year, as I associate it with stress and bedlam. Modern technology has made the problem worse instead of better because I get questions via personal and office phones including a plethora of texts from other colleagues and county agents along with e -mail questions from two different e-mail accounts. Plus educational Facebook posts rarely go without immediate questions and AgriLife Extension has "Ask an Expert" where people from all over the world send questions. And on top of that I've always helped Dr. Parsons' plantanswers.com with hard to answer questions or plant ID dilemmas. On that subject, there's rarely a day that goes by that doesn't include multiple "What is this?" texts or e-mails. And yes, we still get a few snail mail letters.

Dealing with all of these is the main reason I've never been able to write a new article, magazine article, newsletter article, or blog "on the clock." And now that I'm married, I can't write them "off the clock" either! If you are a gardening "expert" of any kind, every man, women, child, stranger, friend, and relative will line up to throw questions at you in the spring, so here are the some pointers on how to deal with them.

1. If you don't know the answer, say so. But tell them you will try and find out. Write down their information on the info sheets provided at the Master Gardener desk including their question, address, phone number, and most important of all, their e-mail address! There's an extension publication dealing with almost every subject out there, so you don't have to know the answer. You just need to get the appropriate publication to them. If you don't know how to save an attachment from the aggie horticulture website and attach it in an e-mail you need to learn because that's how most publications are sent these days. Plus, it's much more efficient to answer in a short e-mail than a long drawn out conversation or game of phone tag.

2. Also send them a list of the certified arborists, landscape professionals, and horticulturists which is in a folder on the MG computer desk top as well (Keith Hansen is for hire!). Unfortunately the only site visits I have time for are for landscape professionals and nurserymen. If you are sitting at the MG desk with nothing to do, stock the folder with current publications from Aggie Horticulture or Aggie Turf. And while you are at it, you can make copies to stock the display rack with.

3. Please do not take a message and put it on my desk as these get buried with a constant barrage of other messages and questions. Research and find the answer and get back with them. I once left a job with 100 messages stacked on my desk waiting to get called back. Folks get angry when they don't hear back.

4. I don't try to search Aggie Horticulture or Jerry Parsons' Plant Answers I just Google "Blueberries Texas A&M," "Asian Lady Bugs Texas A&M," or whatever the question might be, and generally the most current publication from Texas A&M AgriLife Extension is among the top finds. Do not send non-university information or outdated information.

5. Some questions are better served by others. Timber, tree, and forestry questions can be referred to the Texas A&M Forest Service or one of the local certified arborists on our list. If there's a questions about plant diseases provide them the link and form for the Texas A&M Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in College Station. This can easily be attached in an email as well. Many just need a copy of our fruit and nut spray schedule, recommended fruit and nut varieties, or landscape plant list. These are all easily attached in an e-mail. If they don't do e-mail they can come by the office to pick them up or they can be mailed to them. Make sure you know how to use the copy machine as well. Also remember the secretaries have many other responsibilities other than horticulture, so try and handle as much of it yourselves as possible.

6. If for some reason you find yourself bored at our office, my demonstration beds around the Cotton Belt Building always need attention (as do my pot plants), the trash around the building always needs to be picked up, my bluebird boxes need monitoring, and the sidewalks always need be blown. We will treat the area around our building as an urban public garden to show everybody that they can grow something. It will mainly feature Texas Superstar plants and Earth Kind roses.Greg
