## Our Tyler Rose Garden

I've said it before and I'll say it again. Our gardens at the Tyler Rose Garden are legitimate public gardens, and as you all know, our IDEA Garden is as classy as any in the country. It's far and away the prettiest and best maintained part of the Tyler Rose Garden. That's because of good direction, constant planning, and lots of volunteer labor.


Our renovations to the Heritage Rose Garden are ongoing. The plans are to gradually reassume its mission to showcase the antique roses that led to the development of the other roses in the Tyler Rose Garden and those that were in the Tyler Rose Industry. In the future we will be meticulous about not only the roses we grow in that garden but the heirloom companion plants that grow alongside them. It will essentially be a "period garden" that looks like a grandmother's cottage garden. In addition to showing off reseeding old-fashioned annuals we plan to also display the heirloom bulbs that we sell in our sale. As you may have noticed, due to shade cast by the large Muskogee crapemyrtles, we are adding new beds in the sun.

My plans are to also upgrade the Sunshine Garden to fulfill its original intent in being comprised of mostly yellow "sunny" looking plants. As shade is becoming an issue there as well, some of the trees and woody plants will need to be removed. To lessen maintenance, the goal is to use all perennials to create a "sunshine border."

Though our Shade Garden is acceptable it's in desperate need of more volunteers and on overall leader. As I've already volunteered to, at least temporarily be in charge of the Heritage Rose Garden, I would like somebody interested in shade gardening, woody plants, or public gardening to be in charge of the Shade Garden. Right now we only have a scant part-time assembly of volunteers in that garden so we aren't really able to keep up herbaceous plants adequately. If this remains the case we'll just have to embrace a woody plant collection (arboretum) since

they don't require as much handson time. Since we already have a nice collection of camellias and Japanese maples, I plan to expand both of those collections to give us continuity. Since maples provide outstanding and varied fall color, this gives us something in our garden that most other areas of Texas don't and can't have

Right now we have issues in that garden with irrigation, weeds, vol-



As you probably know, the Camellia Society that no longer exists, originally planted the camellias and the Tyler Men's Garden Club, that no longer exists, contributed a number of the Japanese maples in the collection. I would like to both maintain and diversify those plantings.

I need somebody that can oversee this garden, recruit volunteers to tend it, keep plants labeled and mapped, monitor the bluebird trail there, and send out e-mail alerts about the garden as needed. It's a beautiful garden that ties all our other gardens together and I will keep adding a diversity of new and unusual woody plants, spraying the weeds with herbicide, and blowing the paths there as time permits each week.

I would also like each person in charge of the different gardens as well as any regular volunteers in the gardens to attend the Texas Association of Botanic Gardens and Arboreta meeting each year. At these meetings, all the public gardens in Texas, both large and small; present there last year's worth of activities in a short presentation. It's the only time each year that all these like-minded garden folk get together to visit. Next year's meeting will be hosted by The Gardens at Texas A&M February 20-22. I very much want us to have a presence there. -*Greg*

The Board of Directors met October 19, 2018. The following action items were discussed:

**2019 Budget** – The Board approved the 2019 budget, with a proposed net income of slightly over \$5,000. The new budget will be posted on VMS and the member section of the SCMG web site prior to November 1, 2018.

**TAMU Scholarship** – The \$2,000 scholarship for the 2018 -2019 school year was awarded to Sarah Lozano of Tyler, Texas.

"From Bulbs to Blooms" Conference and Sale – The Board discussed the positive feedback received on this year's bulb sale. Bulbs not sold at the October 13 sale will be offered to SCMG members at the November 1 meeting in Harvey Hall.

VMS – The board discussed the lack of compliance with reporting hours on VMS. The Board will look for ways to assist members in this area.
