



Library Lecture Series

May 17, "Home Landscaping: Right Plant, Right Place" - Greg's 5 basic principles of landscape design, including do's and don'ts, with Greg Grant, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Horticulture Agent for Smith County.

Please enter your Volunteer Hours and Continuing Education Hours (CE's) in VMS. All Volunteer hours and CE's are required to be entered monthly and MUST be completed by December 31, 2019. (Class 26 has until April 2020). It is your responsibility to 1) do the hours and 2) to enter the hours into VMS. At the end of each year the Board of Directors will review your entries for Volunteer Hours and CE's. The Board must follow both Texas MG Association and SCMGA policies regarding Volunteer Hours, CE's and entry into VMS. Greg needs hours entered by the end of the month so TAMU can continue to justify the need for a Horticulture Agent in Smith County. We appreciate your commitment to supporting SCMGA by remaining current with this important Master Gardener duty.

Turfgrass 101 for East Texas:



A. Types of grass available:

- 1. St. Augustine (Coarse texture, shade or sun, vegetative only, prone to chinch bugs, brown patch, take-all-root-rot, and grubs, medium fertility, high mowing height)
- 2. Bermudagrass (Fine texture, sun only, vegetative or seed, high fertility, low mowing neight)
- 3. Centipede grass (Medium texture, sun or part shade, vegetative or difficult seed, low fertility, medium mowing height)
- 4. Zoysia (Fine texture, sun or part shade, vegetative only, medium fertility, medium mowing height with a sharp mower, slow growing, more expensive)
- 5. Perennial ryegrass (Fine texture, sun or part shade, seed only, low mowing height, cool season annual for winter overseeding only, expensive)
- 6. Annual ryegrass (Coarse texture, sun or part shade, seed only, high mowing height, cool season annual for winter overseeding or erosion control, cheap)
- B. **Mow frequently**, never removing more than 1/3 of the leaf blade.
- C. Use 3:1:2 ratio fertilizer such as 15-5-10, 18-6-12, 21-7-14 or similar (premium lawn fertilizers are better but more expensive as they contain slow release forms of nitrogen). Do not use "weed and feed."

D. Fertilizer rates:

Centipede (fertilize once per year in spring)

St. Augustine and zoysia (fertilize twice per year in spring and fall)

Bermuda (fertilize three times per year in spring, summer, and fall)

E. Mowing heights:

Bermuda (low, 1 inch for hybrid, 2 inches for common)

Centipede and zoysia (medium, 2-3 inches)

St. Augustine (high, 3-4 inches)

F. Irrigation:

Most lawns are watered too frequently leading to increased diseases like brown patch, dollar spot, and gray leaf spot. Sprinkler systems are best kept on manual and run once each week (1 inch at a time, less rainfall) during the months of June, July, and August. That's only 12 times a year total. Sprinklers should not run during the fall, winter, or spring.

Shade Garden Update

Thanks to the 30 plus volunteers that worked in the Shade Garden in March and April. A lot of work on general clean up and eliminating weeds was accomplished. Thanks to all of you for your patience. I know that digging weeds every week is not such exciting work, but we also got other things done: The stone edging around the bench garden (#13) at the entry by the Camellia Garden sign was rebuilt, and we moved lots of ferns to other beds. We planted 6 new Red Buckeye Trees. Katy Barone and her friend Sue Norton constructed a dry creek bed in Bed #5. We tested the sprinkler system with Rose Garden supervisor and learned that once many leaking heads are repaired, we should have adequate irrigation in the hot months. Liriope was moved to fill most all of the empty spots in the beds.

In May we plan to trim azaleas, fertilize the beds, and resume new plantings. Priority for new plantings include deciduous azaleas, camellias, maple species, Texas Superstars and windfall plants from SFA or Overton.
