

From Bulbs to Bloom



The initial kick-off meeting for this year's bulb sale was held May 7th. The major subcommittees are now staffed. Many of the interns were there to learn more about this significant event. Many of our members have taken advantage of their opportunity to pre-order bulbs. Thank you to the members that responded in a timely manner to the short notice. Our member pre-orders came to almost 1000 bulbs! This bulb order is being rolled in with the order for our bulb sale which will be placed soon. Brenda Strong/Teresa McBrayer

Shade Garden Notes

The azaleas and camelias have finally finished their "performance" for the spring. We fertilized all of them with a 9-15-12 fertilizer that is recommended for azaleas and camellias.

Our volunteers have trimmed all the azaleas and inspected for lace bugs. Luckily, none were found on the 130+ azaleas in the Shade Garden.

Dead limbs were pruned from the camellias, and we inspected for tea scale. Tea scale was found on 52 of the 118 camellias in the Shade Garden. If you have camellias in your home landscape, suggest that you inspect them. We treated the infested shrubs with systemic imidacloprid.

With the advent of spring we're introducing new plants to the beds. These include deciduous azaleas, hostas, camellias, red buckeye, and some others. Overton will be donating some new impatiens that are downy mildew resistant; also some new begonia varieties. This will allow us to add some summer color to the beds.

Special thanks goes to:

- Jeff Brown spent many, many hours repairing sprinkler heads and water lines.
- Nan Bateman continues to devote time to plant identification and bed mapping, and finding azaleas and other plants for the garden.
- Debbie Kober donated several plants that she planted in Bed 3.
- Dana Anderson and Jan Mott (and others) who have fought an ongoing, 5 month battle eradicating Iris pseudoacorus from Bed 10.
- The 30 individual volunteers that contributed their time to the Shade Garden in May.

We will continue to work the Shade Garden on Wednesdays from 9am to 11am, and on Saturday, June 1 and 15 from 8am to 11am.
