

Deena is the Wood County 2018 Master Gardener of the Year, certified in Square Foot Gardening and Keyhole Gardening, and has Advanced Training in Vegetables. ### **Digging Bulbs**

Things are beginning to get into full swing for our annual From Bulbs to Blooms conference and sale. Anne Pattullo and I have placed several bulb orders, but there are still lots to dig, divide, and sort with now being the time when I start. For about 20 years I had my own small wholesale bulb farm that sold to special places like Old House Gardens, Plant Delights Nursery, and the Smith County Master Gardener's bulb sale, so I thought I'd let you in on some bulb farming production protocols.

Bulbs are divided up according to bloom time. But even more important than when they produce flowers is when they produce foliage, as each year's foliage stores up energy for next year's bloom. So when you see a bloom on a tulip or hyacinth, it's because of how the farmer grew the bulb the previous year in Holland. Spring bulbs start producing roots in the fall and produce foli-

age during the winter and spring. They go dormant during the summer. Summer bulbs produce foliage during the spring, summer, and fall and go dormant during the winter. They have year round roots. Fall bulbs produce foliage during winter and go dormant during the summer.

Though bulbs adapted to East Texas are tough enough to be dug and divided any time, to ensure blooms the next year it's important to dig them after the foliage has fully matured, ripened, and withered away. On those that go dormant, it's also important not to dig them before root growth has started for the next season.

Here's a list of some I dig for our sale and when I do it.

- **Daffodils, narcissus, jonquils, and Byzantine gladiolus**: These go dormant starting in late spring and are dug after the foliage is completely brown or gone entirely. They must be dug before root growth starts around September. I typically dig them in June or July then let them cure before separating, sorting, and sizing. Those that are planted back are put in the ground immediately or before the first rains in August and September when new root growth starts.
- **Crinums and daylilies**: The ideal time to dig and divide them is just before spring growth starts but since our sale is in the fall, I dig them as close to sale time as possible.
- Lycoris and oxblood lilies: These are dug and divided the same time as the daffodils, narcissus, and jonquils (summer) as they have the same growth cycle. The main difference is that fall bulbs bloom before their foliage emerges and spring bloom after. Actually what I do is dig them in full bloom and separate out the largest ones with bloom stalk to insure blooming sized bulbs. They too go into bushel baskets or plastic crates to dry and cure.

For our sale to be successful and popular it's very important that all bulbs we sell be up to industry and consumer standards, which means high quality, true-to-type named cultivars, and blooming-sized bulbs. We'll let other Master Gardener groups do plants swaps, no-name bulbs, and baby starter bulblets. Many cool plants are exchanged and gained at these type sales but we want ours to be one of a kind...the best.

#### PREPARATIONS FOR FROM BULBS TO BLOOMS SALE - OCTOBER 12, 2019



This is your alert to think of the role you might want to play during this fun day. There will be SIGN UP sheets at our August meeting. I have added a brief synopsis of each duty. This is our biggest event and we need ALL HANDS ON DECK. Keep in mind, even if you contribute hours for a task completed prior to the actual sale portion of the event, your participation during the sale would be very welcome. You are all appreciated!

**REGISTRATION** – we will need (8) people to be present at 8 AM. Registration always begins at 8:30, but there are always those who want to come early and get a choice seat. Registration will remain open until 10:30. Registration folks can sign up for another duty once registration is closed.

**SALES** – we will need (20-25) people. Even if your knowledge of bulbs is scant, Anne Pattullo will give you instructions on the bulbs for which you will be responsible. She will meet with the sales volunteers at 10:30 prior to our October 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting to explain the duties in detail and give you information regarding your bulbs.

WAGONS – none will be needed this year due to how we will be handling the trees and shrubs.

**TICKET WRITERS** - (16) people needed. Two ticket writers work together to count and prepare the tickets for each customer. One ticket writer sorts the customer's purchases, the other ticket writer fills out the ticket which the customer will take to the cashier

**TICKET HELPERS** – (2) people needed. These folks will manage customer flow ensuring everyone goes through the ticket writer line, then into either the cash/check or the credit card line. These folks will be constantly moving and watching people throughout the sale.

**TRANSPORTATION** (Team Leader Harvey Collen) Harvey and his crew will report Thursday, Oct 10, at 8 AM to gather bulbs, goods, supplies, etc. from the MG Office and transport to Harvey Hall. After the sale, the Transport team will also load leftovers and return to MG office. "Day of sale" these Transport people can join Security team.

### 2018 Extension MG National Report

As we volunteer on the local scene, it is sometimes interesting to look at the bigger picture. With information compiled by the Extension Master Gardener National Committee, using 2018 data, the size of the Master Gardener program nationally is surprising.

With 86,076 members, the MG program is one of the largest volunteer organizations in the country volunteering 5.6 million hours. The value of those hours amounts to over 140 million dollars annually when 8.6 million clients were served! Master Gardeners stay current, reporting Continuing Education totaling 901,246 hours. Nearly 14,000 new people were trained in 2018.
