

September 2019 Association Meeting Thursday, September 5, at the Rose Garden Center at 11:30 AM.

Our August speaker talked to us about vegetable gardening and this month we are going to continue in the same vein with a talk centered around herbs. Our own County Agent, Claudann Jones, will do a presentation on "Cooking with Herbs." She hinted to me that those of you who go to lunch afterwards may not be as hungry after the meeting and that she needed a helper to pass out samples. (That helper position got filled really quick!) Claudann is a real delight to talk with and listen to and I know you will come away with a wealth of information. - Debby Watkins





Those manning the Smith County Master Gardener help desk have truly been a tremendous help to me and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Office. I get, on average, about 100 questions a week directed at me via two e-mails, two phones, Facebook, and face to face, so naturally its extremely difficult to handle them all since many don't provide enough information to answer and sometimes the answers take time to find. I handle the difficult ones along with those from my county agent, university, and industry colleagues but need help with the general public. Even if you don't help manning the help desk, remember that as Smith County Master Gardeners your primary job is to help me educate the public with sound science and research-based gardening information that makes their lives healthier, happier, and prettier.

We get lots of questions about lawns and different turf problems, especially with St. Augustine grass since it's so common. The important topic right now is the timing of pre-emergent herbicide to prevent cool season winter and spring weeds that germinate with our first rains and cool weather. If you don't follow my good friend Neil Sperry on Facebook or read his free E-Gardens newsletter, you should, as he (being a former Texas A&M Extension horticulturist) is almost always spot on. Here's what he recently had to say about applying pre-emergent herbicides:

Garden Tip: TIME HERE FOR FALL PRE-EMERGENT WEEDKILLERS! (First warning)

- To prevent germination of annual bluegrass (Poa annua), rescuegrass and ryegrass.
- Apply DIMENSION, HALTS OR BALAN granules.
- Only one application.
- BETWEEN NOW AND SEPTEMBER 7.
- This is your only chance. Once these weeds sprout and start growing you do not get a second chance. There is no spray to kill them later without harming your lawn.
- These granules can be used on any type of grass as long as it has been through one winter.
- They can be used beneath trees.
- Mow your lawn, then apply the granules, then water the soil moderately.
- Only one treatment will be needed.
- Note that these products often are labeled as "Crabgrass Preventer." They're the same products we apply in spring and again in early summer to prevent germination of crabgrass and grassburs, but this time we're using them only for winter weeds. This treatment will do nothing to help with grassburs or crabgrass.
- Gallery can be applied if you have a history of broadleafed weeds. It's a pre-emergent weedkiller that also must be applied before they germinate.
- If you decide to use Gallery, apply it one day after the treatment with one of the products above, then water again.
- With broadleafed weeds like henbit, chickweed, dandelions and clover you do get a second chance. You can apply a broadleafed weedkiller spray around Thanksgiving or in late winter. Read and follow label directions.

NOTE: If you have a lawn care company looking after this sort of thing for you, their timing may be slightly different. They have access to different products. They also can't get to all of their customers on the same date just because Neil says that's a great day to treat. If their work gives great results, we need to let them do their job. Great Grant




From Bulbs to Blooms

Articles from Local Writers appear in Texas Gardener Magazine

The September/October issue of *Texas Gardener* arrived the other day complete with an article from Julia Squibb, Smith County Master Gardener. Also, both Keith Hansen and Greg Grant are regular contributors to this publication.

Julia's article, titled "From Bulbs to Blooms" chronicled the SCMG bulb sale from its 1999 beginning to the present. Complete with several pictures, this well written article provided not only the history of the sale, but enough information about the 2019 sale to make the reader note the date and plan to visit Tyler.

Keith Hansen's story, titled "Beauty and Inspiration at the Tyler Rose Garden" gave a rather complete history of the garden from the 1930's to the present. He includes information on the Smith County's Master Gardeners involvement at the garden. His details of the Heritage Garden, IDEA Garden, Shade Garden, Sunshine Garden and the Japanese maples included in the garden makes it clear that the famous Rose Garden is much more than roses. He mentions that the park is really a beautiful botanic garden and that Greg Grant plans to ask the city of Tyler to designate the demonstration gardens at the Tyler Rose Garden as the "The Tyler Botanical Garden".

"In Greg's Garden" is a regular feature of the magazine. This month Greg's contribution is titled "Falling for Color". As suggested by his title, Greg talks about the fall color here in East Texas and other parts of the state. He lists the trees providing our fall color. He notes that fall for us is really a second spring which provides a host of autumn flowers.

With all this information about Texas and especially Tyler, readers of this magazine may well be marking their calendars and planning their trip here in mid to late October. If I didn't live here, I know I would. *Martin Davis*
