Q&A

Between my friends, family, and the public, I get lots of gardening questions. There's not any moment of any day that I don't have questions waiting to be answered on my desk, phone, or computer. Two e-mails, two phones, and two Facebook pages just compound the problem. You can help me out by answering as many as you can and volunteer-

ing at the Smith County Master Gardener help desk. Here are some of the latest:

Q: What are the yellow haloed, brown circles in my St. Augustine?


A: Brown patch (large patch) a common fungus caused by cool temperatures, frequent watering, and regular fertilization. Wet periods when it rains several days in a row can also create the right conditions. Unfortunately like all fungal diseases, it's easier to prevent than cure. The first thing to do is turn off the irrigation and make sure not to run it more than one time a week (one inch per application) during June, July, and August only. Also don't fertilize centipede grass more than once per year or St. Augustine or Zoysia lawns more than twice per year. Q: When is the best time to plant shade trees and what are pushed off by the new ones each spring. do you recommend? I want something fast growing.

ing trees like cottonwood, Chinaberry, pawlonia, weeping zone. willow, etc. are never recommended as they are shorter O: Do tree roots rise up out of the ground as the tree lowed to grow over the root zone and they should be in the way. mulched with an organic mulch, watered every two weeks during June, July, and August, and fertilized with a sprinkling of lawn fertilizer in spring and fall.

Q: What type of lawn fertilizer do you recommend? Should I use "weed and feed?" Is it too late for fall fertilization?

3:1:2 ration like 15-5-10, 21-7-14, 18-6-12, etc. A premium professional lawn fertilizer with part quick release nitrogen and part slow release nitrogen is best. I get the



times. I use lawn fertilizer for annuals, perennial, shrubs (except azaleas and blueberries), trees, and vegetables.

Q: Can I use soap to control crapemyrtle bark scale?

A: You can use it but it won't control it. Although soap and oil sprays didn't prove effective for crapemyrtle bark scale in trials, I personally would use dormant oil on them each winter (on a mild day) just to make myself feel better. The best control is achieved with systemic imidicloprid insecticide applied just when the new leaves are budding out in the spring. Texas A&M AgriLife has a publication telling all about crapemyrtle bark scale on the Aggie Horticulture website. Just Google "crapemyrtle bark scale Texas A&M."

A: Tree roots do not come to the surface with age. They just get larger (like trunks) and bulge out of the ground. Unfortunately you can't cut them off or cover them with topsoil or you'll injure or even kill the tree. Your best bet is to disguise them with mulch or groundcover. Shade Garden News


