### **March 2020 Association Meeting**

Have you been to your local feed store lately? Or Atwood's? Tractor Supply? If you have, then you know that it's **Baby Chick Time** in East Texas! I've been waiting with anticipation for weeks, looking forward to rebuilding my flock after a rough year of dealing with predators.

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It's like this every spring, heck almost year round. I always hear some variation of the same comments: "You are hiding from me." "You don't return my calls." "You are never in your office." "I can never find you." "Why are you ignoring me?"

Welcome to the life of a county horticulturist. It's all about time

(not enough of it) and numbers (way too high). This is why the Master Gardener program was developed...to help county extension horticulturists and keep them from going cuckoo (OK, more cuckoo in my case).

As you well know, horticulture is more popular than agriculture, 4-H, and family and consumer heath, combined. After all, gardening IS the number one hobby in the world. County horticulturists don't have the option of sitting around and waiting for phone calls, planning our day, or plotting programming for the year. Being a county horticulturist is like jumping into a water spout on the ocean with a day planner in your hand. It's about keeping coconut tree or an oncoming cruise liner.

I generally field around one-hundred questions and requests per week via two phones, two emails, two Facebook pages, and of course never ending face to face. It's nearly impossible, but almost doable, IF the job ended there. I could just about handle all the questions if it was all I had to do. But certainly it isn't.

The hardest part of my job is writing articles and reports both critical parts of my employment. The only way I can write is with complete silence and no interruptions. That means no writing at the office at all which features interruptions every five seconds to five minutes. I love to write but it takes time and silence. My general rule for writing articles (if they are already in my head) is two hours for each article and two hours to locate and label images for each one. That goes to four hours for writing and four hours for images if it's an assigned topic. Every week I must produce a 500 word gardening column for the Tyler Morning Telegraph. Every month I must produce a 1,000 word blog, a 500-1,000 word Grapevine article, a travel report for the county, a commissioner's report for the county, and Texas Data entries for Texas A&M AgriLife documenting everything I did that month. Every other month I must produce a 1,000 word article for Texas netic Spring! - Greg

Gardener magazine. And once a year I must produce Achievement Reports and In-Depth Summaries detailing everything I did for the year plus at least two mandatory Result Demonstration Reports on research I did or facilitated that year.

Paperwork is a huge issue. BEFORE I got married I wrote books, reports, and articles early in the morning and in the middle of the night. Unfortunately cats, caterwauling, and a few friends that know when I'm awake have made writing and concentrating very difficult. I'm afraid there will be no more books until I retire!

And then there's my speaking, teaching, and public lecturing. Putting together Power Point presentations takes as much time as writing article and gleaning images, generally twice as long. And photography and filing takes even more time than that. They too all require dead silence and concentration. I've now done almost 2,000 lectures in my life. For the first 20 years of my career I did 50 lectures per year. And though I love to give presentations, they are a logistical nightmare.

I'm not complaining. This is my job. This is my life. However I do need your help. Please be patient. There are always dozens if not hundreds waiting in line in front your head above water and trying not to be dashed into a of you. But also don't hesitate to remind me as each day more questions and requests are piled on top of each other. Please e-mail questions when you can as I can look at those in peace and give better answers. Do not use Facebook for general garden questions as it's absolutely impossible to handle any more. Use the Help Desk and secretary Allison Morrow when you can. Please don't walk into my office without an appointment made through Allison as I'm usually woefully behind on a report or frantically trying to answer another question or beat a deadline. If you are an experienced Master Gardener, please help me answer questions, write articles, and give talks as there simply isn't enough of me to go around. Chime in when you can. If you are a beginning Master Gardener, pace yourself and don't try to ask me every gardening question you've ever had as you probably won't remember all the answers or get them all done anyway. Do not use the Master Gardener intern training class for general gardening questions not specific to the teaching topic of the day as it's distracting to others. And please don't ask me questions or show me things as I'm getting ready to give a program or presentation as it's very difficult to concentrate on the subject at hand. Save those questions for after the program or better yet email them to me. Happy Fre-
