

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What about a Greenhouse?



About a year and a half ago, our current Master Gardener President, Debby Watkins, gave a presentation on Greenhouse Management at one of the Friday Library series. It was so inspiring! So many people were interested in having a greenhouse, even if it was only a little 'hoop house' in the back yard. As Master Gardeners, we were excited as well. Oh, the things we could do with a greenhouse of our own! We could have a series of educational presentations, have talks about propagation, grow various plants for our gardens at the now Tyler Botanical Garden, maybe have enough for additional plant sales, and so much more. So many people were interested, that Debby put together a subcommittee to investigate the possibilities.

As a new subcommittee, we really did our homework. We looked at partnering with various nurseries and school greenhouses all over the county. We contacted James Wilhite who owns Wilhite Landscaping in Tyler to see if they would be willing to share some space with us. We also checked with a couple of school districts that were known to have agricultural programs and greenhouses. We made a trip to Whitehouse High School and were given a tour of their facility and we visited the City's Rose Garden greenhouse. There were so many options. We finally decided the best course of action however was to work with the City of Tyler at the Rose Garden. One thing that worked in favor of the City was the fact that their greenhouse was located right behind the IDEA garden and across the street. A much shorter distance to transport plants when ready to plant. Their facility was also not being used except to store supplies and some plants prior to planting, but unfortunately, it needed a lot of repairs. A LOT of repairs. But as gardeners we looked at this as an opportunity for a collaborative project that would provide hands-on experience in building and developing a greenhouse for the benefit of our gardens as well as our members. Sounds like a mouthful, but basically as gardeners, we're in the business of growing things, so why not a greenhouse?

Step one, the repairs. The covering for the greenhouse has basically disintegrated and will need to be replaced. The City had already purchased a new cover and we've scheduled August 10^{th} as a workday to put the it on. Before that workday, the City will finish taking the old cover off. The City will reserve equipment to help with the job and even though we've scheduled the workday for August 10^{th} , we're reserving the 11^{th} and 12^{th} as workdays, just in case there's bad weather and we can't do it on the 10^{th} . So, if you think you'd be able to help on the 10^{th} and possibly the 11^{th} or 12^{th} , please sign up by emailing Liz Wiley at txmimi52@suddenlink.net.
