Gardening with Kids Greg Grant

Gardening as a child literally changed my life. It gave me a lifelong connection with nature, the outdoors, science, hard work, and healthy nutrition. Unfortunately, today most children are disconnected from the outdoor environment. Humans were made to till the soil and harvest their own food. It just doesn't seem natural to me to do otherwise. Children are like dry sponges when they are young, soaking up new ideas, concepts, knowledge, and habits. Why not start them on the road to a physically and mentally healthy life by encouraging them to garden?

Miss Mozelle, my legendary first grade teacher at Mozelle Johnston Elementary School in Longview appointed me keeper of the class terrarium in first grade. She was a real teacher and knew just what each student needed to learn. My fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. Sandra Field allowed me to read a book about George Washington Carver, which forever inspired my horticultural career. Elderly Mr. Adams, a short walk from my house, let me help him garden and taught me how to grow Irish potatoes. I'll never forget putting pieces of potatoes in the ground and later bringing a sack full of whole potatoes home to my mom . . . pure magic. My grandfather, Eloy Emanis, taught me how to produce all the common vegetable crops, and my grandmother, Marquette Emanis, showed me how to put them up and prepare them. And, my parents, Neil and Jackie Grant, assigned me my own separate patch of the vegetable garden to do with as I pleased. It didn't take long for them to realize how interested I was. They quickly turned the whole garden over to me!

outdoor gardening environment, including history, biology, chemistry, math, literature, art, and more. It's all there. Unlike classroom learning, it's hands-on and interactive. It's hard not to be interested and learn when something's growing before your very eyes, thanks to your own input. And, for sure, the beauty of the whole setup is you get to eat your homework! There's no reason the dog should have all the fun.

For childrens' gardens, it's best to start small. If experienced adults will be helping, an open patch with tilled rows will work. However, in most cases a raised bed, as small as 4 x 4 feet, is a good place to start. It can easily be filled with a professional-grade potting soil or a composted vegetable garden mix from a local landscape supply company or home-improvement store. If drip irrigation is installed along with a generous mulch of straw or dried grass clippings, watering and weeding will be much simplified.

For more information, check out the *Junior Master Gardener* program. The Junior Master Gardener program is an international youth gardening program available through the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. JMG engages children in novel, "hands-on" group and individual learning experiences that provide a love of gardening, develop an appreciation for the environment, and cultivate the mind. Also check into *Learn, Grow, Eat & GO!* (LGEG), a research-based, evidence-based curriculum project of the Junior Master Gardener Program. For more information, visit the JMG website at jmgkids.us.

Shade Garden

In the Shade Garden during the month of July there were ups and downs. We had robust work days with a good number of hard working Master Gardeners and interns. The crew made use of the time weeding, dead-heading, light pruning and keeping the space watered through the three-digit days. Irrigation issues had us watering some areas by hand. Nevertheless, the Shade Garden is looking good as a result of the team effort.

Further, we are pleased to report that all four carex species in our trial are doing well. An ongoing drama, our fountain is on the fritz – another burned out motor. However, we have been assured that a new one is on it's way. In other news, city arborist, Maddy Burton, kindly came by to take a professional look at a few of our oaks that have us concerned. Sadly, two of them at the north end of Bed 6 will have to be removed. Another, near the far bed we call Pluto, is also on it's way out.

On that note, the SG bed leaders met to prioritize tasks and projects for the remainder of 2022 and to discuss the budget for next year. Having lost so many trees in the spring has much of the garden now in full sun. This challenge has provided the leaders an opportunity to re-image bed plans going forward, to include adding new tree varieties. Still highest on our list of priorities is replacing the many camellias lost in winter storm, Uri. We are in the process of identifying nursery sources who have camellias in stock as we prepare for fall planting.

Lastly, on the happiest of notes, East Texas Preferred Properties has generously sponsored the purchase of two concrete planters for the Shade Garden. We found some nice ones at Breedloves Nursery and are looking forward to snazzing up the area by the fountain. A very special and heart-felt thanks goes to Ann Hooks and her daughter, Holly, for making it all happen.
