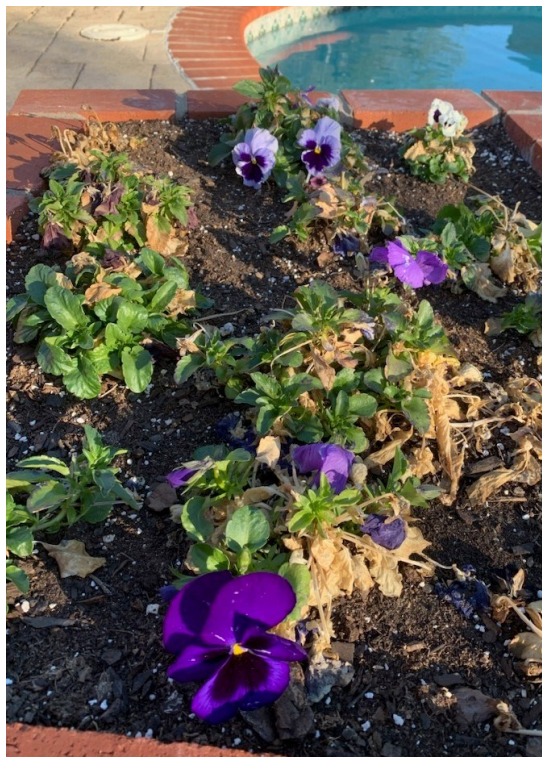


Top: The Columbines survived the summer heat and are ready for spring. Don't look at the weed please.
